"Thousands of our dollars are in serious danger of going up in smoke, our only earthly hope depends on the efficiency of that little band of trained men. Most of us lose the greatest part of our usefulness at a fire because we become excited. But the fireman remains cool in a scorching heat.

"I am now cool and normal and wish to most sincerely thank you and your splendid men for the excellent service you rendered at the fire at my place this week. Pass my hearty thanks along to the men. Our city should be proud of its Fire Department, and I believe it is. May you all long be spared to protect our homes."

Appreciation Of Col. Brown

C. N. Official to be Thanked For His Interest in Prince Rupert

The Chamber of Commerce, at its meeting last night, decided to send a letter of thanks to Col. J. Carleton Brown, Pacific coast manager, Canadian National Steamships, thanking him for his action in having the Canadian Spinner overhauled in Prince Rupert and asking that still more of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine vessels be overhauled at their own shipyard here. The suggestion was made by Capt. Paul Armour who remarked that any private firm would do all their own work in their own yards instead of giving it out to competing firms. No private firm could succeed who did business along these lines. Wallaces had recently overhauled the Canadian Winner at Vancouver.

President Pillsbury said the work on the Spinner had helped out very materially in Prince Rupert as had also the overhauling of the coastal vessels. Col. Brown had made good his promises. S. E. Parker asked that Prince Rupert men be given a chance to sign on these vessels when they sailed from here instead of having all the men brought in from the south. This will be included in the letter.

Big Freighter To Vancouver

Canadian Spinner Gets Away After Spending Year in Dry Dock Here

Canadian National Steamships freighter Canadian Spinner sailed at 7 o'clock this morning for Vancouver where she will be recommissioned in the intercoastal service between Vancouver and Montreal after having been tied up for the past year at the local dry dock. Before leaving, the vessel was given a complete overhaul at the local yard. In command of the Canadian Spinner is Capt. W. Wright, former marine superintendent for Canadian National Steamships on this coast, while Capt. Duncan McKenzie, company pilot and veteran navigator of this coast, is piloting the vessel on her trip through the inside passage from here to Vancouver.
