Packers at Lowe Inlet and well known in Prince Rupert, is again acting as general manager this year of the British Columbia Fishermen's Co-operative Association which has been engaged in the salmon canning industry for the past two years. At the annual meeting of the association, held recently in Vancouver, L. H. C. Phillips, president, said: "All things considered, the 1931 operations were quite satisfactory, showing a surplus in spite of the fact that exchange on the pound sterling caused some losses in United Kingdom shipments. It was not expected that the year's results would be the same as if general business conditions had been normal." The association has definitely decided to operate its Vancouver cannery this season but no decision as yet has been made in regard to other plants.

John Dybhavn, general manager of the Massett Canners Ltd. cannery at Old Massett in addition to his other multifarious duties in the fisheries, is of the opinion that none of the canneries in the Queen Charlotte Islands district will operate this year, which is the big cycle year for pinks, unless the market for that variety of salmon improves very materially within the next few months. Mr. Dybhavn's plant was the only one in the district to operate last year and then it put up only a very small pack.

Lining For Hold

During the past winter a new metal hold was installed in the local halibut boat Ingrid H., Capt. Charles Lundquist. This particular type of metal is expected to aid much in keeping the fish in good condition prior to landing. The metal was supplied through Edward Lipsett Ltd. and the installation was done by Ratchford & Shenton with the assistance of Capt. Lundquist and crew.
