Hostilities Between Paraguay and Bolivia More Acute Since Declaration of War

ASCUNCION, Paragua, v. May 16: -Hostilities in the war between Paraguay and Bolivia have been continuing even more vigorously since the official declaration of war by Paraguay last week.

It was the first official declaration of war in the world since Guatemala entered the World War in 1918 by declaring hostilities on the Central Powers and also the first since the formation of the League of Nations thirteen years

This latest declaration of war, was based on Bolivian aggression and violation of the territorial integrity of Paraguay beginning with the Bolivian attack on Pitiantuta on June 15, 1932, and also in view of the failure of all peace efforts. The two countries have been in unofficial warfare for several months.
