Sailing Ship Fandango on Leisurely Cruise to Alaska

One of the most attractive yachts to put into Prince Rupert in the course of Alaska cruises this season was here overnight in the Nova Scotia sailing schooner Fandango, having on board a party of Southern California millionaires consisting of C. E. Hoffman of 1.40 Pasadena and Mrs. Hoffman, Mr. :02 and Mrs. Alfred Brant of Canoga 15 Park and Mr. and Mrs. W. Harvey of 25 Pasadena. The Fandango is one of the finest sailing yachts ever to visit this coast. With her low. graceful lines, her rakish, towering masts and picturesque bowsprit, she makes a fine marine picture. The vessel, whose first visit it is to the British Columbia coast, was built at Lunenberg, N.S., and was originally the property of a New York millionaire, having been acquired two years ago by Mr. Hoffh.p. diesel engine.
