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

### UNITED STATES INFLATION

The United States has decided to inflate the currency. Printing more dollars is an easy matter. France wiped out 80% of her debt in a similar manner, Italy 75', and recently Britain has moved in a similar direction. # EVIDENCE

Parts of Well Known Halibut Vessel Picked Up on Beaches By Search Boats

KETCHIKAN, March 9:-- An additional large amount of wreckage from the missing halibut vessel Reliance has been found, including eight buoy kegs, parts of the bow and some of the crew's clothing.

Bits of wreckage drifting up on the bleak Dixon Entrance shore almost within a stone's throw of Tree Point lighthouse tell the grim story of disaster to the sturdy little hallbut vessel and of death to her crew of four stalwart veterans of many a battle with the sea.

The first definite evidence that the craft had foundered on the way from Prince Rupert to Ketchikan came to light when Captain William Muller of the Venus picked up life preservers and a flag pole from the unsettled waters off Cape Fox,

Brought to Ketchikan, these served to give added impetus to the search and the coastguard cutter Alert resumed the hunt. Searchers from the Yellowstone found a part of the hull of the Reliance and other wreckage on the beach less than a quarter-mile north of the Tree Point lighthouse.

Gus Borgen of the Traders Company had outfitted and sent the Yellowstone, with Captain A. Strand in charge, in the Seaketch to make thorough search. The Alert had made the first search, definitely establishing that the boat had disappeared from sight. It was felt then that the next day or two would find wreckage cast up on the shores,

It is probable now that the full account of what happened will never be known. It is regarded as almost certain, however, that the Reliance either foundered in the open waters, or was dashed to pieces after drifting ashore in the face of wind and tide. Whether the four men took to a small boat and tried to make shore, or died when the boat went down suddenly probably will never be known:
