British Aviator Seeking to Beat Amy Johnson's Record to Capetown

LONDON, April 12: (CP)—Determined to break the record of Amy Johnson Mollison, Capt. William Lancaster, British aviator, broke into the limelight again yesterday when he was winging his way toward Capetown, having taken off from Lympne early in the morning. He landed at Adrar, Algeria, last night and took off this morning in continuation of the flight.

Capt. Lancaster received considerable notoriety last year when with Mrs. Jessie Keith Miller, Australian aviatrix, he was made defendant in a trial for the murder of Haden Clark, novelist, at Miami, Fla. The couple were acquitted but were later ordered deported from the United States.

MacDonald-Mussolini Pact Is Acceptable To Important Powers

Great Britain, Italy, Germany and France Now Reported in Agreement—Further Developments Announced in Rome Last Night

ROME, April 12:—It was declared authoritatively here last night that four major nations of Europe—Great Britain, Italy, Germany and France—had accepted in principle the MacDonald-Mussolini plan for peace and disarmament in Europe. Germany's approval came during the day as a result of conferences here between Premier Mussolini and Chancellor Adolf Hitler. It was also intimated late last night that France was agreeable to the plan with certain reservations.

SWAN SONG FOR BOARD

Does Not Expect to Sit Again in View of Impending Commissionership

In view of the accepted inevitability of the appointment of a commissioner to take over the administration of civic affairs at an early date, Chairman Arthur Brooksbank, at last night's school board meeting sang the "swan song" of the school trustees who, like the mayor and aldermen, will likely be soon without their civic jobs.

Mr. Brooksbank thanked the principals of the various schools who were present for their co-operation with the board during its term of office and expressed the hope that the commissioners would be at least agreeable and that members of the teaching staff would like him. Mr. Brooksbank, before adjournment, also expressed appreciation of the work and co-operation of other members of the board. They had done all they could.

OTTAWA, April 12 (CP)—The budget of Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, passed the House of Commons last night on a division of 107 to 72.

The Progressive sub-amendment calling for modification of the budget in favor of currency inflation, nationalized insurance and a national credit bank was defeated 171 to 13, all Conservatives and Liberals uniting against it.

A Liberal amendment of direct want of confidence in the government was defeated 119 to 63.

Premier Tolmie Tells Saanich Conservatives Coalition Impossible

VICTORIA, April 12: (CP)—All avenues leading to union of the two major political parties in the provincial field for the duration of the depression appeared to be closed last night as Premier S. F. Tolmie, in an address to the Saanich Conservative Association, outlined plans tending to clear the political atmosphere. Having failed to

form a direct union with the Liberal party, the Premier declared that it was now his intention to proceed with the program laid down last fall which includes reorganization of the cabinet and preparation of a platform which will be followed in due time by preparations for an election.

OPPOSING RECEIVER

Notice of Motion for Special Council Meeting Posted By Ald. Basso-Bert

Ald. Basso-Bert has intimated his intention of leading a fight in the city council against the proposed appointment of a commissioner to take charge of the administration of civic affairs. The following notice of motion has been posted at the City Hall by Ald. Basso-Bert for consideration of the council at a special meeting which has been called for tomorrow night to consider the application which has been made by Frederick Gordon Sweet, representing bondholders, in the Supreme Court of British Columbia at Vancouver seeking authorization of the appointment of a commissioner following default of the city in payment of a \$25 bond interest coupon.

"Whereas the bondholders have appealed to the Supreme Court for the appointment of a commissioner for this city in spite of the fact that the city council has inaugurated a policy of stringent economy and retrenchments,

Therefore, be it resolved that this council take immediate action to protest such appointment."
