ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 4: (CP)-An upturn in whale oil prices is hailed as good news by hardy Newfoundlanders who, up until a few years ago, made a good living hunting the monsters of the sea.

It is likely that operations will be resumed in Newfoundland waters in April, and many of them expect to find employment. Not so long ago upwards of 250 men were engaged in the annual killing expeditions. Capt. Anonsen, managing direc-

tor of the Newfoundland Whaling Company, has bought out the interests of the company in Newfoundland. He is at present in Norway, where the transfer was made last December.
