OTTAWA, March 21:-Estimated on a basis of the present business conditions Hon. E. N. Rhodes, in his budget speech this afternoon, stated that the budget was designed to produce in 1933-34 a surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditures of \$2,000,-

Revenues for 1933-34 under present taxation are estimated at \$287,000,000. Ordinary expenditures are estimated at \$369,000,-000. The deficiency on ordinary account is to be met by further reductions in controllable expenditures amounting to \$14,090,000 and new taxation yielding \$70.
