BANK SHOWS UP WELL

It is no wonder people are jealous of the banks. Take for instance the Bank of Montreal, the financial statement of which appeared in this paper yesterday. The statement shows that a profit of over three million dollars was made during the year, most of which was paid out in the form of dividends. This is less than the bank has made for many years but it is more than most business firms are making proportionately on their capital investments.

This particuar bank has done less business, made less profits and paid smaller dividends but is financially stronger than ever and its liquid assets are greater. It has cash on hand amounting to seventy-eight million dollars and about five times that much in government securities which could be immediately sold. There are also large sums out on "call loans," an increase over former years.

It is the holding of these huge liquid funds that insures the stability of the Canadian banks in any time of stress. That is why the Canadian banks have been able to withstand the tremendous strain of the years of depression and insure to depositors the safety of their savings.
