FREEMAN BRYNOLSON IS KILLED IN HUNTING FATALITY

Trolling Boats From This Port With Prince Rupert Men Aboard Victims of Vancouver Id. Storm

OLE JOHNSON, HELGE JACOBSEN, EINAR OKSVIK, SOREN KNUITSEN AND EINAR MORTINSEN BELIEVED TO HAVE PERISHED ON TUESDAY MORNING.

Wreckage of Two Boats Is Found; Two Others Missing

BELLA ASHORE WITH PILOTHOUSE GONE—E. O. 1629 IS GROUND TO MATCHWOOD—NO TRACE FOUND OF S. K. AND KENO—TWO MAKE PORT.

VICTORIA, Dec. 7: (CP)—Five Swedish fishermen from Prince Rupert are believed lost with four fishing boats in a storm that swept the west coast of Vancouver Island Tuesday. The missing craft and men are:

The Bella, the wreckage of which was found five miles west of Clo-oose, which had Ole Johnson and Helge Jacobsen aboard.

The E. O. 1629, the wreckage of which was found eight miles west of Clo-oose, which had Einar Oksvik on board.

The S. K. which is unreported with Soren Knutsen.

The Keno, aboard which was Einar Mortensen.

The Dovre, with Alfred Anderson, has arrived at Bamfield and the Magna, with two men, at Beecher Bay.

The men and boats came south from Prince Rupert several months ago and were enroute back with the intention of trolling off Bamfield for a few days.

The weather was favorable when they left Victoria Monday but, off Port San Juan wind rose. The advisability of making haven was considered but it was decided to push on, according to Alfred Anderson. An hour past San Juan the wind increased to a gale and the craft headed into its teeth, hoping to ride it out. Between 1 and 2 o'clock Tuesday morning Anderson saw the lights of the three boats and at 5 o'clock sighted the Bella. At day-break, however, he could not pick up any of them. He concluded that they had headed for Bamfield and struggled through the storm to that point himself to find out that he had been the only one to make port.

WRECKAGE IS FOUND

Yesterday morning Dan Holliday, Government Telegraph lineman, came upon the wrecked hull of the Bella with its deckhouse gone. Three miles further on he found the E. O. 1629 ground almost to matchwood. Boats and men sent on patrol from Bamfield found no further wreckage or survivors.

PLANNING FOR WORK

Pattullo Advocates Use of National Credit—Discusses Financial Phase of Problem

Premier's Parley

Western Premiers Endorse National Public Works Program—Ask Ottawa to Relieve Single Men

VICTORIA, December 7 (Canadian Press)—Rational use of the national credit was advocated yesterday by Premier T. D. Pattullo for the fulfilment of a "work and wages" program. He suggested that unemployment could be materially relieved without a policy of inflation.

"If British Columbia controlled its own credit and customs we could double our population in a short time," the Premier declared. "Thirty thousand dollars set aside annually for sinking fund purposes would retire a million dollar loan in twenty years. This province could afford to go behind several millions a year and still be solvent."

Mr. Pattullo's statement followed the conference of premiers of the four western provinces who endorsed a proposal of an extensive program of public works for unemployment relief to be financed by the national credit and, if necessary, the issuance of additional currency.

The federal government will be urged to assume all responsibility for the relief of single unemployed men.

Uniformity of relief measures and a system of contributory unemployment insurance are also urged.

To Travel Together To Russian Capital

Ambassador William Bullitt to Be Met at Berlin By Commissar Maxim Litvinoff

BERLIN, Dec. 7:—It was stated here yesterday that William C. Bullitt, new United States ambassador to Russia appointed following the official recognition of the Soviet Republic by President Roosevelt, and Maxim Litvinoff, Russian commissar of foreign affairs, would meet here and journey together to Moscow. Mr. Bullitt is now on his way from the United States and M. Litvinoff, who has been in Rome conferring with Premier Mussolini of Italy, is expected to spend a few days in the German capital awaiting the ambassador's arrival.

Wife of Member Of Commons Is Dead at Vernon

VERNON, Dec. 7: (CP)—Mrs. Grote Stirling, aged 60, wife of the Member of Parliament at Ottawa for Yale, died on Tuesday night here. Before her marriage on January 22, 1903, to Mr. Stirling, deceased was Mabel Katherine Whish, daughter of Dr. R. Whish, Brigstoke, R.N., of Beyrout, Syria. Besides her widower, she is survived by two sons and two daughters.

Well Known Coast Lumberman Shot In Mistake For Deer In Neighborhood of Khutze Inlet

SUCCUMBED ABOUT FOUR HOURS AFTER BEING INJURED IN RIGHT LEG BETWEEN KNEE AND THIGH—INQUEST BEING HELD THIS AFTERNOON—REMAINS SOUTH TONIGHT.

About four hours after being shot in the right leg between the knee and thigh in mistake for a deer by a companion on a hunting expedition in the neighborhood of Buteedale, Freeman G. Brynolson, aged 40, of Seattle, president of the Northwest Spruce Co., son-in-law of City Commissioner W. J. Alder of Prince Rupert and himself a former resident of this city, succumbed to shock and exposure yesterday afternoon aboard the Kelley Logging Co.'s service boat Nora Jane. The unfortunate incident took place about 12:30 noon in the bush between Buteedale and Khutze Inlet while deceased and Jack Hanson, logging superintendent for the Kelley Logging Co., were engaged in hunting for deer. About 4:30 p.m., after having been taken aboard the Nora Jane, Mr. Brynolson, despite all that could be done by his companions to save his life, expired. The Nora Jane arrived in port about 8 o'clock this morning to bring in the body and report the tragedy.

An inquest is being held this afternoon before Deputy Coroner A. J. Lancaster and, accompanied by Mr. Alder and members of the party, the remains will be placed tonight aboard the steamer Prince George for delivery south for interment. News of the tragedy will prove a general shock to the community of Prince Rupert for Mr. Brynolson was well known here. Only recently his wife had visited the city with her parents, City Commissioner and Mrs. Alder.
