The story goes back to the year 1903 when the German fleet under Admiral Kontre Scherder paid a miral's flagship was the Veneta, and this was the name given to Mr. and Mrs. Harry P. Blakeley's daughter, born while the fleet was

Admiral Scherder was told of the event, and a year later the girl's parents received a letter from him. along with a miniature lifebuoy and a large picture of the "Veneta." Three years later he sent the girl a neckpiece in the form of a gold cross set with precious stones from his wife's birthplace.

In the 26 years: that followed, the Blakeley family had no word from the German admiral. During the war, they heard that his ship had dead. Later. Veneta Blakeley married Roy S. Brooks of Wollaston Mass., and moved to Bay State.

There on July 29. Mrs. Brooks again received a reminder from Admiral Kontre, now 88 years old and retired. He traced her through the German consul at Halifax, and sent her a letter and a string of
