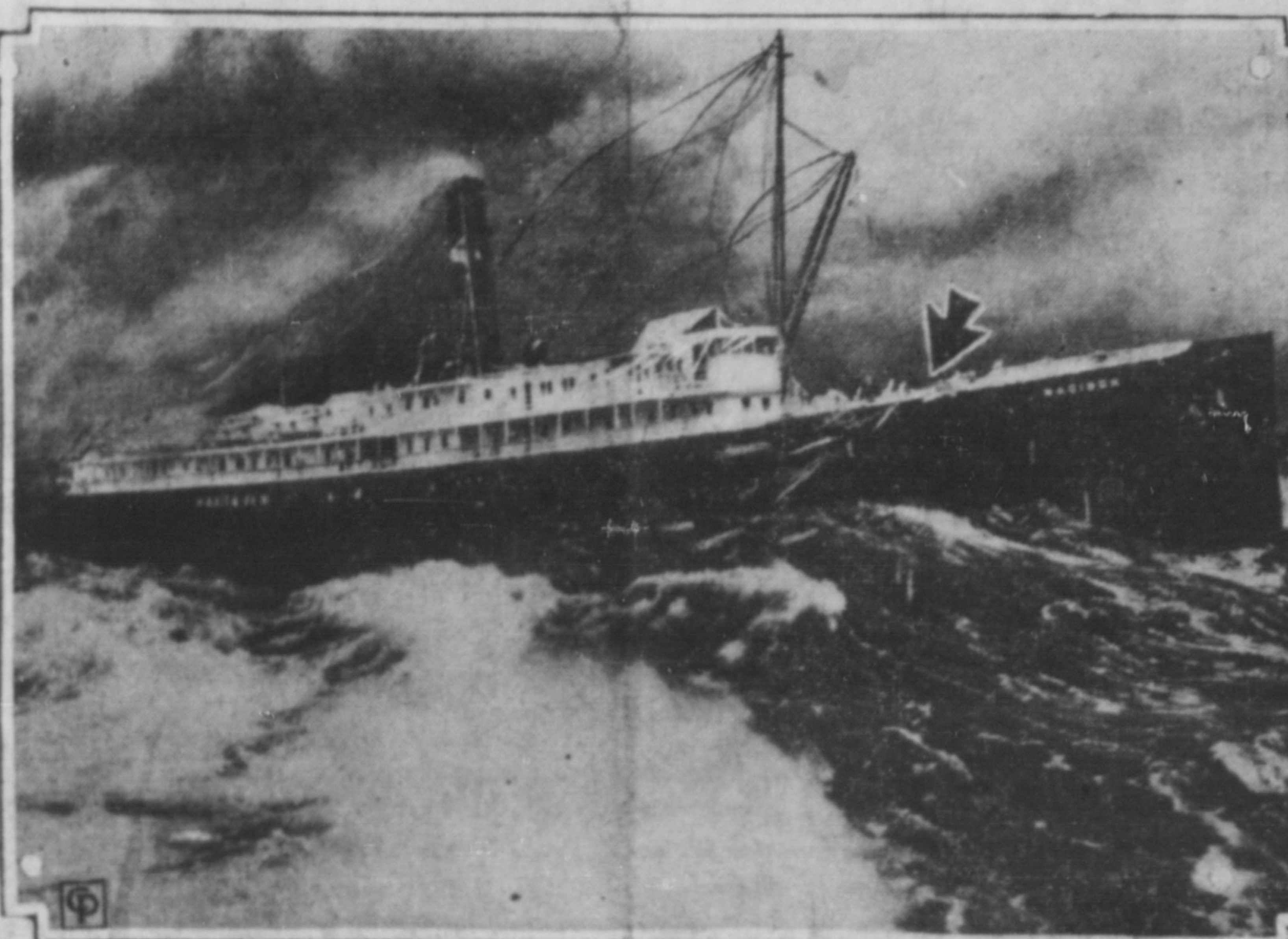

How Storm-Tossed Liners Looked in Grip of Storm



Here is a composite picture depicting the liner Madison in the throes of the terrific storm now sweeping the Atlantic seaboard. Two lives were lost and two sailors injured when a tremendous wave ripped away the deck house (shown by arrow). The ship sent out an S.O.S. off Capt. Charles, Va. The storm, one of the worst in years, swept along the Atlantic coast doing millions of dollars damage and killing at least eight people.

DEAD AT AGASSIZ

Col. Boulbee, Resident of Province For Forty Years, Passes at Age of Seventy

AGASSIZ, Sept. 9: (CP)—Lieut. Col. Frank Washington Boulbee, aged 70, a resident of British Columbia for 44 years, died here Thursday. He was one of the heads of the Chilliwack Implement and Produce Co. Ltd. Born at Ancaster, Ont., May 23, 1864, Col. Boulbee was educated at Hamilton and at the age of 19 joined the engineering staff of the Manitoba and Northwestern Railway, coming in 1887 to British Columbia to engage in snow shed work on the Canadian Pacific Railway engineering staff. He was with the Vancouver waterworks department from 1889 to 1911.

Serving with the Winnipeg Field Battery, Col. Boulbee played a part in putting down the Northwest Rebellion in 1885. After coming to British Columbia, he continued his interest in military affairs and was an officer with the Fifth Regiment, Canadian Artillery, and the Sixth Regiment. Col. Boulbee's recreations were fishing and shooting.

CHURCHILL IS CLOSING

Final Grain Ship of Season Sails From Hudson Bay Port

PORT CHURCHILL, Man., Sept. 9: (CP)—This Hudson Bay port is preparing to close for the winter following the sailing yesterday for the United Kingdom of the steamer Gardania, ninth ship to load here this year, with a cargo of over 200,000 bushels of wheat in her holds. Less than 40,000 bushels of grain is left in the local elevator.

Ottawa To Assist In Marketing of Wheat Montreal Report Says

Advances to Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers Limited to be Guaranteed, Grain Circles of East are Informed

MONTREAL, Sept. 9:—The federal government has decided to finance the 1933 wheat crop on the prairies, it was reported in authoritative grain circles here yesterday. Advances by the banks to the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers Limited (Wheat Pool) in connection with marketing of grain will again be guaranteed by the government, it was stated. This is following out a policy which has been exercised in recent years and which is designed to assist in orderly marketing of grain.

Crisis and Way Out

William Irvine, M.P. for Wetaskiwin, Urges Change of System

"The Present Crisis and the Way Out" was the subject of William Irvine, M.P. for Wetaskiwin, Alta., who addressed a large meeting last night at the Moose Hall here in the interests of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation. Mr. Irvine spoke for about two hours and, despite the fact that he devoted the most of the time elaborating upon the "crisis" and theorizing as to its causes and had, apparently, little out rather nebulous generalities to offer as a "way out," he was given an attentive hearing. An orator of the eloquent and spell-binding type, his speech was punctuated with frequent witticisms and, if not very enlightening, was, to say the least, entertaining. Ex-Ald. Oscar Larsen occupied the chair.

In opening, Mr. Irvine enumerated what he considered the outstanding factors in the present economic situation. First, the agricultural industry had been producing for some years at less than cost with the result that the standard of living of the farmer had been gradually lowering until he had now reached the point where he could hardly furnish himself and his dependents with the necessities of life and the whole industry was jeopardized. Second, there was the growing army of the unemployed which in Canada had now reached over one million persons who were being perforce maintained at the expense of those who still had jobs or part-time jobs. Both private and public business had become paralyzed, the country's trade was dropping, despite wage cutting and tax increasing the governments were becoming increasingly involved financially and private and public debts were continually growing.

Canada, as well as the other nations of the world, was reaping the bitter fruits of capitalism in the form of continuously growing unemployment, the concentration of the national wealth among the few while poverty increased among the majority, staggering debt and international strife and war. Never had there been such universal want in the midst of such tremendous abundance. Out of the colleges and schools of the country were annual-
