SILVER AND WHEAT TO BE DISCUSSED WEST AUSTRALIA VOTES SECEDE FROM COMMONWEALTH

Matters of Economic Importance Coming Up At Washington Parley

Canada Will be Represented at Conversations Which Will Be Held in Washington Preparatory to World Economic Conference

WASHINGTON, April 10: (CP)—Cordell Hull, Secretary of State for the United States, indicated today that among the subjects to be taken up in the forthcoming Washington conversations with various countries, including Canada, would be the restoration of the price of silver and the control of wheat surpluses. Other matters will also be taken up preparatory to the world economic conference.

LOST LIFE IN SKIING

Young British Mathematician Caught By Avalanche in Rockies

LAKE LOUISE, Alberta, April 10 (CP)—R. E. C. Paley, famous mathematician from Cambridge, Massachusetts, lost his life near here on Saturday in a skiing accident. The young man had ascended a nearby 9,600-foot mountain alone when he evidently missed his footing a few hundred feet from the top and started a small avalanche. His body was found by searchers on Sunday 2000 feet below in a valley. Paley had recently been engaged in mathematical research at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Cambridge.


Miriam Hopkins Sprains Ankle in Fall Down Stairs

RANGERS TWO UP

Toronto Maple Leafs Lose Second Game in Stanley Cup Series

TORONTO, April 10: (CP)—The New York Rangers defeated Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night by a score of three to one in the series for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship. The Rangers require only one more win to clinch the series, having won the opening game at New York last Wednesday night. Tomorrow night will see the third game of the series while remaining games in the best three out of five games series will be played Thursday and Saturday nights if necessary.

ARMY IN FORESTS

Quarter of Million Men to Start Work in United States This Month

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt's "forestry army" of 250,000 men is expected to get to work by the middle of the month in the national parks of the country. The men, who will be under military discipline and will live in camps, will receive \$1 per day with board and lodgings. Medical examinations of recruits are now proceeding throughout the country.

ROCK SHED DEMOLISHED

Big Slide on Canadian National Railways But Traffic Is Being Handled Except for Carload Lots

Fish Tied Up

Cave-in Occurred Saturday Afternoon Due to Weight of Snow and Ice

As a result of the collapse of a rockshed between Kwinitsa and Skeena City stations on the line of the Canadian National Railways forty-three miles east of here, the railway line is expected to be closed at least a week but arrangements have been made during the tie-up to transfer all traffic in both directions with the exception of carload lots, the movement of halibut eastward thus being seriously affected with only "L.C.L." shipments being accepted. Passengers, baggage, express and mail are all being handled.

The rockshed caved in about 3:30 Saturday afternoon under the weight of a veritable mountain of snow which was lying on top of it. Practically the whole shed, which was about five hundred feet long, went through except for small sections on either end.

Full railway gangs are now at work clearing the line which job however, cannot be accomplished in less than a week, it is anticipated. A road was built over the hard snow and it is over this that the 1000-foot transfer of traffic is being carried out.

DEAD ARE GIVEN UP

Atlantic Ocean Surrenders Three More Victims of Akron Crash Including That of Commander McCord

ATLANTIC CITY, April 10—Bodies of three additional victims of the crash of the giant dirigible Akron were yielded by the sullen waters of the Atlantic yesterday about eight miles from the point where the airship struck the ocean early last Tuesday morning and was demolished. These bodies included those of Commander F. C. McCord, commander of the Akron, and Commander P. T. Berry of Lakehurst naval air station. The bodies, which were sighted and picked up by one of the searching destroyers, were brought into Atlantic City.

ARMY AND NAVY CUT

\$200,000,000 Slash in Expenditures Is Ordered By President Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt has ordered a \$200,000,000 reduction in army and navy expenditures in United States for this year, it was announced yesterday.

JEWS ARE EXCLUDED

Will Henceforth Be Barred From Public Service in Germany—Nationality Re-defined
