There are several principal points in common between Bolshevism and Fascism. In the initial stages of their respective movements both according to their inspiring theories depended upon successful political revolution upon which further application and development of these theories were based. In both countries opposition is not tolerated and the only party in power is maintained by dictatorship. The difference is in the objectives. Bolshevism is aiming to emancipation of Russia from the protracted misery of capitalistic anarchy resulting from unco-ordinated and uncontrolled economic pursuits of people by means of planning economy and the state control of the necessary capitalistic phase of evolution eventually may arrive at Socialism as intended.

The mistakes and shortcomings of the manner in which these aims are being carried out are bad but seem to be the heritage of the respectable pre-Bolshevik regime with the devastation brought upon the country by the white mercenaries and the subsequent economic blockade now end-



Seaman Watson Trims LaBarba



CONSISTENTLY BESTED FIDEL IN FIERCE FIGHTING

Seaman Tom Watson, British featherweight champion, came through his first North American test with flying colors January 27, winning a convincing 12-round decision over Fidel LaBarba, rugged veteran from Los Angeles. Almost under the gun in the first round, a sweeping left hook jolted the pale and startled Briton from his feet but the Seaman came back fighting furlously without taking the benefit of a count. Again in the fourth, as he bounced off the ropes, Watson's jaw collided with one of LaBarba's left swipes, but he still took no count. Once he had feit the canvas under him, Watson, a spindly-legged veteran of the King's navy, came back with a vengeance. His pawing left beat a tattoo on LaBarba's face and he consistently bested Fidel in the fierce fighting at close quarters. Photo shows the two fighters in action in the third round.

The average fan looks blank when you ask him when and where the game of baseball had its beginning. Well, here's the dope: Many years ago-in 1839the first plan for playing the game was worked out by Abner Doubleday of Coopertown, New York.

Mr. Doubleday did a good job of thinking, for he specified the dimensions of the "diamond," and those dimensions have stuck right up to the present day. Incidentally, the "diamond" was then called

a "square." It was six years after the introduction of the game, or about 1845, that the first baseball club came into existence, and was known as the Knickerbocker Basebal lClub of New York. In that year, also, the first rules of the

game were drawn up.

More clubs took up the game, and the Knickerbockers played the first interclub match game on reford at Hoboken on June 19, 1846. vith a team known as the New Yorks. The score was 23 to 1, the ame having gone four "hands." Did that "hands" stump you? That was the original manner of referring to innings.
