Geneva Parley Refuses To Accept Reason from Berlin for Withdrawal

Gathering Will Go Into Session Again on October 26—
Germany Claims Other Nations Refuse to Disarm
While Refusing Her Defence

GENEVA, Oct. 16: (CP)—The world disarmament conference adjourned today until October 26 after declining to accept Germany's reason for withdrawal that the great powers were unwilling to reduce their armaments while refusing Germany the right to arm herself with defensive weapons. MET WITH DISASTER

Fear Expressed For Safety of
Alaska Mail Boat's Crew and
Two Russian Scientists

SEWARD, Alaska, Oct. 16: (CP)—Fear is expressed for the safety of two Russian scientists and their rescuers with the discovery at the end of the week of the capsized mail boat Good Hope in shoals eight miles north of Cape Prince of Wales Island, Alaska.

The scientists were rescued by the mail boat after they had been shipwrecked on little Diomed Island, only to be shipwrecked again when the Good Hope turned over in the shoals off North Cape. Mariners believe that the mail boat was driven into the shoals when the motor failed in a storm.

Former Ladysmith City Clerk Given Five Years in Pen

NANAIMO, Oct. 16: (CP)—C. J. Callin, former city clerk of Ladysmith, who was convicted at the Supreme Court Assizes here last week on a charge of theft of \$2340 of civic funds, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment by Chief Justice Aulay Morrison.

Louis Poulain of Ladysmith, convicted of manslaughter by a jury here in connection with the fatal stabbing of Robert Syme on a street at Ladysmith on September 7, was sentenced to two years' imprisonment by His Lordship.

CHICAGO, Oct. 16:—Surgeons from the United States and abroad have reported to the American College of Surgeons that 12,746 cases of cancer have been cured in the last three years.

To Try Again For Stratosphere Altitude Record

Lieut.-Commander T. G. W. Settle, well-known navy balloonist, plans a second attempt to reach the stratosphere from the Chicago world's fair in an effort to surmount the height record of 11 miles, 1,406 yards (62,335 feet) set by three Russian scientists, Prof. Geo. Proloff, Ernest Brinbaum and C. D. Godunow. The new mark of the Russians is more than a mile higher than the distance attained in the flight of Prof. Auguste Piccard, Belgian scientist, and the first man to reach the stratosphere. Settle's first attempt ended when the balloon failed to keep altitude.

BRITAIN IN COME-BACK

Foundation Today Almost as Strong
As Before War, Says
Runciman

ST. IVES, Eng., Oct. 16:—"By contrast with 1931 when we were almost on the financial rocks, we have now attained the position of being the strongest financial country in the world with the most credit," declared Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, reviewing Great Britain's financial come-back in an address here. "We have been able to place our national finances upon a foundation almost as secure as before the world war," he said, adding that England was also regaining, bit by bit, her old position as a world trader.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16: (CP)—Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison, famous British aviatrix, is in the Polyclinic Hospital here for a week's rest following her recent aerial adventures. She receives friends at tea every afternoon and expects to leave the institution early this week.

This Year by Frost and Snow,
First Time in History

Bishop G. A. Rix arrived home Saturday night after being away for a couple of months visiting in the diocese and also paying a brief visit to Toronto to attend the House of Bishops. Nearly half the time was spent in a tour of the churches in the Peace River country. Asked as to the Peace River this season, the Bishop said that an early frost had injured the grain this year and about the same time snow had fallen and beaten the crop down, thus accentuating the injury. It was the first time in the history of the district that the crops had been so badly injured.

LOCAL MAN ON COUNCIL

T. H. Johnson Elected to Executive
Of Canadian Chamber of
Commerce

OTTAWA, Oct. 16: (CP)—W. Sanford Evans of Winnipeg was elected president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce at its annual convention here at the end of the week. Councillors include T. H. Johnson, president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and general manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., who attended the convention.

Personal freedom and personal responsibility to the state were described as the most effective means of bringing Canada out of the depression by Floyd F. Chambers, editor of the Financial Post, in addressing the Canadian Chamber of Commerce here. He stressed the importance of preserving private enterprise and individual initiative.

DOUBLE UP MINE CREW

Work to Continue Throughout Winter
on Columario With Thirty
Men Employed

Mill in Spring

Development Program Costing \$25,
000 to Precede Selection
Of Site

Fifteen men are now employed in development work on the Columario mine on Gold Creek near Usk and in the near future it is planned to double this crew, stated John Willman, manager of the company, who left at the week-end on his return to the interior after a brief visit to the city. Camp accommodation for the additional men is now being arranged for. As a result of this development work, it will be possible to determine the most suitable site for the concentrating mill which it is planned to install on the property. Work on the mill will be started by next spring, it is hoped. It is planned to continue underground work on the property throughout the winter, the new program of development on the company's holdings being estimated to involve an expenditure of some \$25,000.

H. L. Batten M. E. of Vancouver, the company's consulting engineer, sailed by the Prince George Thursday night on his return south following a visit to the property but is expected to be back on the ground in the course of the next two or three weeks.
