The steamer Salvage King arrived alongside the Prince George at Anyox at 10:30 this morning. according to word received in the city this afternoon.

According to persons arriving from Anyox, the steamer Prince George, which stranded on Askew Reef, near Anyox, on Wednesday night, later refloating and proceeding to Anyox, is far down by the head as she lies at the wharf at Anyox, her main deck forward being almost awash and her No. 1

and No. 2 holds full of water. This morning the arrival of the salvage steamer Salvage King, nearing Anyox from Victoria, was being awaited. The Salvage Princess and White Hope of the Armour Salvage

Co.'s local fleet were standing by. As soon as the Salvage King arrives, it is understood the Prince George will be temporarily patched up and brought on here for dry

docking and possible repairs. Capt. Neil McLean is standing by the Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbs, who had been chief officer on the George, being in command of the Prince Rupert which left here yesterday for Vancouver, taking ver the stranded vessel's schedule.
