HIGHWAY MOST IMPORTANT

The most important thing for Prince Rupert just now is highway construction. For two years nothing has been done although during the same period much public money has been expended. Pretty soon the people of the north will become frantic and will do something rash if no relief comes.

Some of the southern writers and so-called economists have been pointing to the cost of the Terrace bridge, the Prince Rupert Court House, the Hazelton bridge as extravagances. They might better have employed their time pointing to the neglected opportunities for employment on the central Pacific highway between Prince Rupert and Jasper, particularly that part between Prince Rupert and Hazelton.

CHEAPER FERRY RATES

Another very important matter is the auto fare between Prince Rupert and Cedarvale on the railway. The charge just now is prohibitive and, as a result, the Canadian National Railway is losing money that it might earn if it would give a rate that would meet with the public demand. We are told that for a similar distance a rate of \$7.00 has been ordered by the railway board in the south. A rate of \$10.00 would be reasonable here. Then everybody would use the railway for transporting cars to and from the interior and the people travelling would also buy tickets for themselves and the rest of the party.

PEACE RIVER HIGHWAY

We are not objecting to the building of a highway into the Peace River country. That will be needed soon. The north and south must be connected by highway but we claim that in Prince Rupert we have priority of right to highway work.

SURGERY FOR TUBERCULOSIS

Dr. A. S. Lamb Tells Rotary Club of Some of Methods of Treating Patients Suffering From Disease

Telling how, through modern medical science, the doctors were able to give the lungs a rest and thus enable them to recover from tubercular disease, Dr. A. S. Lamb, who has been conducting a tuberculosis clinic in the city, gave a most interesting address before the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Commodore Cafe, Dr. W. T. Kergin presiding.

The visitor told how, in some cases, a needle was passed between the two sacs enclosing the lungs and air was pumped in which had the effect of collapsing the lung or a part of it and thus enabling it to rest while at the same time retaining the blood circulation. Recovery commenced immediately and the patient no longer was a source of infection to others.

The doctor said it had been discovered that climate was not as important in recovery as was at first thought. Patients could recover in Prince Rupert if the rules laid down were followed. Some recovered even when breaking the rules. The essentials were fresh air, rest and, in some cases, surgical treatment.

Another interesting statement made was that the possibilities of getting tuberculosis were less today than formerly and the possibility of recovery greater. The death rate had been lowered until the rate in British Columbia, in spite of many disadvantages, was almost as low as in the other provinces.

In conclusion Dr. Lamb quoted Dr. W. B. Burnett, eminent Vancouver physician, who said a person always had two chances. He might get the germs or he might not. If he got the germs he might then get the disease or he might not. If he got the disease he might recover or he might not and, if he failed to recover, he still had two chances.

Add sugar and salt to egg yolks, pour hot milk slowly over egg mixture, stirring to blend. Return to double boiler and cook until slightly thickened. Add vanilla. Have ready egg whites, beaten stiff, pour hot custard over them, beating constantly. Pour into individual molds, first dipped in cold water. Chill and serve with a garnish of whipped cream and maraschino cherries.
