Wheat Pool Bringing More Grain to Local Elevator; Lease Renewal Reported

Announcement today that 500,000 bushels of wheat is about to be moved from the prairies by the Alberta Wheat Pool into the Prince Rupert elevator is taken as an indication that the Wheat Pool has made some arrangement to again take over the local grain handling plant, the five-year lease on which expired at the end of last month. Although no information is available from local Pool officials, the report is current that the Pool has renewed the lease for another year.

Movement of the new lot of wheat to the elevator, which has been practically empty for some months, will start shortly, it is learned in railway quarters.
