MINING INDUSTRY OF IMPORTANCE

HANDSOME PROFIT ON BULKLEY VALLEY GOLD SHIPMENT

Prince Rupert Will Be Capital of Big Mineral Empire States Engineer

Gold Resources Described—Six New Lode Operations Started—Old Companies Maintain Production—Many Employed

The importance of the mining industry to Prince Rupert is again emphasized by Dr. Joseph T. Mandy, resident mining engineer. In urging the people of Prince Rupert to develop a mining-consciousness, Dr. Mandy predicts that Prince Rupert is destined to become one day the capital of a great mining empire of Northern British Columbia.

COLD SNAP FELT HERE

Thirteen Degrees of Frost Officially Recorded—Chilly Northeast Wind Accentuates Frost

With a bitter northeast wind blowing up during the night, Prince Rupert was in the throes of its first real cold snap of the season this morning but there was some uncertainty as to whether it would be of any considerable duration. The lowest official thermometer reading for the week-end at the Deby Island meteorological station was 19 degrees above zero at 4 o'clock this morning with thermometers on this side of the harbor registering considerably below that.

While the sky was bright and cold here and a steady northeast wind blowing at 10 this morning, the barometer was inclined to be on the low side, having read 29.94 at 4 a.m. and 29.92 at 10 a.m. A heavy cloud bank was to be seen down the coast and Victoria and Estevan stations reported rain.

The wind had swung around to easterly early this afternoon and it was noticeably milder. The barometer had also taken a sharp drop since morning.

Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The British pound sterling closed at \$5.13 1/2, up 1/8c, on the local foreign exchange on Friday. The Canadian dollar closed at \$1.01 1/4 and the French franc at 6.15c.

COAST VESSELS ARE EXEMPTED FROM LOADLINE

OTTAWA, Dec. 11: (CP)—A ship loadline convention between Canada and United States was signed Saturday at Washington exempting vessels of both countries operating solely on defined sheltered waters between Puget Sound and South Alaska from provisions of the international loadline statutes of both countries.

"Gold potentialities of this district are more clearly apparent and definitely recognized," says Dr. Mandy. "Operations intensifying on lode gold have materially increased and, during the last season, six new lode gold operations have started. The big producers, Granby at Anyox and Premier at Stewart, with commendable technical achievement, have fitted operations to the changing economics of the situation. From small lode-gold operations new production has materialized and is expanding."

Among gold producing properties of the district, Dr. Mandy mentions the Gold Harbor property on the Queen Charlotte Islands, the Surf Point mine on Porcher Island, the Ben Ali at Stewart, the Engineer at Atlin, the Dunwell at Stewart, the Hunter and Heather groups at Khatze Inlet, which are planning production this winter, the Skidegate-Sunrise on Graham Island, the Haida Gold on Moresby Island, the Homestake at Alice Arm, the Princess Royal Gold Mines Ltd. on Princess Royal Island at Surf Inlet.

Dr. Mandy says that the Surf Point mine from its 35-ton capacity mill which was completed in July last has shipped gold concentrates to the value of about \$22,000 up to the end of September.

He reveals that, during the trying period which now seems to be passing, the Granby and Premier companies have supported communities aggregating about 3000 people.

Progress This Season

During the past season many examining engineers representing substantial capital have visited the district and on about twenty-one properties, mainly lode and placer gold, new sizeable operations have either been started or are planned in the near future.

Approximately 140 individual placer operations in which about 350 persons are engaged have been active during the 1933 season on about 34 different gold-bearing creeks in widely scattered localities in the district.

Dr. Mandy declared that the country invites courageous, intelligent, persistent and hard-working prospectors and the application of venturesome but soundly and efficiently directed capital. For these there is an enticing field for accomplishment and reward and much virgin ground still untouched.

"I consider," says the district engineer, "that this district is now in the healthiest and soundest condition from the standpoint of mining that it has enjoyed in the course of its history. It is all set for a steady and prosperous progress."

A family of six little children was seen also. These children are suffering from swollen glands. One little boy of three or four years was found in bare feet because he had no shoes or stockings to wear. The children were bright and clean but nevertheless suffering for want of warm clothing.

LINDBERGH'S AT MANAOS

Famous Flying Couple Make 930-Mile Hop to Amazon River Enroute Home

MANAOS, Brazil, Dec. 11:—After making the 930-mile flight up the Amazon River in seven and a half hours, Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh landed here yesterday from Para to which point they had flown at the end of the week from Natal following their crossing of the South Atlantic Ocean last week.

The famous flying couple planned to continue from here today or tomorrow to Port of Spain, Trinidad, a distance of some 1000 miles overland. Flying via the West Indies and Florida to New York, they expect to be home in about a week following an absence since last summer during which time they crossed the Atlantic Ocean by the northerly route and made a leisurely aerial tour of Europe.

REORGANIZE AT GENEVA

Drastic Charges In League Constitution Being Considered

ROME, Italy, December 11 (Canadian Press)—It is stated here that conversations are believed to be in progress in several European capitals looking to an early re-forming of the League of Nations along more acceptable lines.

As for Italy, the Fascist Grand Council, following a meeting, announced through Premier Benito Mussolini that Italy would continue to retain its membership in the League only if it was reorganized drastically.

It is believed here that the League may be divorced entirely from the Treaty of Versailles, "the terms of which have proven so objectionable to Germany, and that the clause in the Covenant providing for the use of military and economic force in the curbing of aggression will be eliminated.

Yellow Metal to Value Of \$100 Per Ton From Glacier Gulch Deposit

Smithers Men Receiving Congratulations on Success of Operation—Expect to Make it Pay From Roots Up

SMITHERS, Dec. 11:—One of the outstanding achievements in British Columbia mining was brought to a successful conclusion last week when Stuart F. Campbell, Grover E. Loveless and Wesley Banta, owners of the Glacier Gulch gold-bismuth deposit on Hudson Bay Mountain near Lake Kathlyn, received the smelter return on their shipment of a carload of ore, the first gold ore shipment to be made from the Bulkley Valley district.

Returns show gold content of 3.0985 ounces per ton, approximately \$100 per ton, for the entire shipment, also silver values of 55 oz. per ton. Bismuth is estimated to be \$90 per ton but nothing is paid the owners for this. After deducting freight charges of \$9 per ton and treatment charges of \$2.20 per ton, there is a very handsome profit to the shippers. They are receiving hearty congratulations from all sides on their well-deserved success. They hope now to be able to carry on the operation themselves, making the mine "pay from the grass-roots" although they have no working capital and have been unable to get any after several years of hard trying.

Just as the gold mining possibilities of the Bridge River and Cariboo districts remained undeveloped and without attention for several decades, so have the latent gold resources of Bulkley Valley district lain untouched and still remain so except for the W. R. Wilson interests of Vancouver and a few local owners. The additional proof of the possibilities furnished by the present shipment should prove a strong incentive to capital to wake up and take advantage of the chances afforded.

Was Witness Of Copp Shooting

Toronto Police Believe That Identification of Student's Slayer May Be Possible

TORONTO, Dec. 11: (CP)—Toronto police believe that there is at least one person in the city who may be able to identify the slayer of Johnny Copp, University of Toronto football player and medical student, who died as a result of being shot by a prowler whom he intercepted in a nocturnal visit at his home. This is Edward Houston a young friend of Copp's, who is thought to have seen the shooting and who is said to have been threatened with death himself if he talks.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT TAXATION PLANS ARE ENDORSED BY CHAMBER

PARIS, Dec. 11:—The government of Premier Camille Chauvets won a significant victory in the Chamber of Deputies last night when a vote of confidence on the taxation phase of its budget program was carried by a division of 282 to 191. It is expected the government will be given a comfortable majority on the main budget motion which is expected to come up today or tomorrow.

READY FOR TARIFF WAR

Japanese Government Arming Itself to Protect Country's Trade

TOKYO, Japan, Dec. 11: (CP)—Spurred by prospect of erection of fresh trade barriers, the Japanese government has announced plans to supply tariff weapons for anticipated trade war to be presented to the Diet December 23, enabling the government to make reprisals against nations discriminating against Japanese trade.

Universal Week Of Prayer to Be Observed Here

The Prince Rupert Ministerial Association, at its regular monthly meeting this morning, decided to observe the Universal Week of Prayer commencing January 8. The various Protestant churches will unite for the occasion and there will be special services and addresses each night. Business at today's meeting was otherwise of a routine nature. Rev. Dr. F. W. Dafoe, the president, was in the chair and there was a full attendance of members.
