"June Bride's" Answers

A Bride-to-be: (1) The bride, of course, removes her gloves at the wedding breakfast and throws back her veil or parts it and pushes it aside.

(2) The maid of honor should wear any pretty, light colored gown which harmonizes with the other gowns of the bridal party.

Her duties are rather indefinite. She usually precedes the bride into the church or room, stands at her left, and is ready to be useful in holding the bride's bouquet or removing her glove at the important part of the ceremony.

(3) The groom's man in the same way is useful to the groom, even looking after the minister's fee and making arrangements for the traveling.

He and the maid of honor should help to make things pass off smoothly and pleasantly.

(4) Yes, the groom usually presents his gifts to the assistants at the ceremony the night before.
