Attorney General Pooley predicted the return of Premier Tolmie at the head of a Unionist ministry with the active co-operation of Labor. Hon. W. M. Dennies said the Unionist Party in British Columbia stood solidly behind health and unemployment insurance through the national government but apparently did not deal with provincial labor policies.
