Water Poured Through Hole in Hull Made by Repair Men and Workmen Clambered Ashore All Except Five Who Were Still Below

SEATTLE, March 25:-Trapping five men in the depths of her hold, two of whom are believed to be dead, the American mail liner President Madison capsized and partly sank at the mooring dock here last night. The vessel keeled over when water poured into the hold through the opening in her side where repair men had been taking off three of

her steel plates. Nearly 150 workmen and members of the crew clambered to safety on the nearby dock.

The stern of the vessel rested on the bottom, the vessel tilting at an angle of 60 degrees.

The men believed to be drowned are Jack Rose, 60 years of age storekeeper and Carl Edberg, 40, a junior engineer.


