> Supreme Court Judge Finds That Major Hartley is Not Entitled To Run in Lillooet

> VANCOUVER, Oct. 24:-Mr. Justice Harold Robertson rendered judgment yesterday in the case in which Major J. C. Hartley, blind ex-service mining engineer, was seeking reinstatement as an Independent candidate for Lillooet riding in the provincial election, the decision going against Hartley who will not be permitted to contest the riding. Returning Officer Alex Ogston had refused to accept Hartley's nomination papers on technical grounds, Milton Gonzales acted as counsel for Hartley.
