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THE WORLD CONFERENCE

Unmarked by flourish or ceremony but speeded on its way by stirring exhortations from King George and Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald for speedy and effective action, the world economic conference was opened in London yesterday at the Museum of Geology. With sixty-six nations, having a total population of nearly two billion people, represented, the eyes of the world will be naturally rivetted upon that epochal gathering, as it proceeds with its deliberations during the ensuing days or weeks. What happens there will probably determine how long the depression, under the burdens and trials of which the whole world has been laboring during the past three years, is to last and if any immediate relief from existing conditions may be expected.

That the delegates may be actuated by wisdom, vision and dispatch in their dealings and that prejudice, hatred and nationalism may not mar their activities is greatly to be hoped. If this great gathering cannot do something real to remedy the ills of the world in its time of extremity, the outlook will be very discouraging indeed. All the people of the earth will hope for the best.

THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY

Meantime, British Columbia continues its merry political sideshow with chief interest still centering in the Conservatives or whatever we may choose to call them. Certainly those who might have expected anything in the way of action at the much-heralded meeting of the provincial Conservative executive on Saturday last were due for disappointment. Whether or not the wind was taken out of its sails by the announcement of Hon. H. H. Stevens, which was only to be expected, that he would not consider deserting the federal for the provincial field at this time, it seems to have been a negative enough gathering. The only thing that happened, apparently, was to let Mr. Twigg out as organizer which is just another indication of how hopeless the party feels so far as the attempt to prevent T. D. Pattullo and the Liberals returning to office as a result of the forthcoming election is concerned.

With the single, solid party under decisive and able leadership and solidarity and unity in its ranks on one hand and a confused lot of "what nots," divided by community interests, inability to agree on leadership, and racked by quarrels over control of the broken down political machine and the empty work barrel on the other, the scene is certainly an unprecedented one in the political annals of the province.
