# Proceedings Against Doukhobor Chief Are Condemned by Judge

'British Justice" Declares Mr. Justice Robson in Discharging Alleged Undesirable From Custody

WINNIPEG, June 13: (Canadian Press)-In a judgment condemning as "bad," slipshod" and "rash" the proceedings of an Immigration Department court of inquiry which sat here last Friday and ordered the deportation from Canada of Peter Verigin, Doukhobor leader, as being an undesirable, Mr. Justice H. A. Robson today dis-
