The committee went on record in favor of immigration of agriculturists but not of financing them. It declared in favor of giving work to the unemployed and urged construction or reconstruction of buildings and the extension of credits. It urged balanced budgets, removal of trade obstacles, encouragement of private initiative and enterprise and suggested that governments should keep out of business as far as possible. While expressing interest in the Roosevelt policy they did not favor it for Canada but strongly approved the Empire agreements which it was said had already benefited the country. They urged closer relations with the United States within the bounds of its Empire agreements.

The report including the reading of the declaration of policy was listened to with great interest by the members of the local chamber and hearty vote of thanks was given Mr. Johnson for acting as local delegate.
