One of these is that no man should be kept at the public expense without working, unless he is ill or aged. The second principle is that no person should be denied the right to work for a living at a decent wage. No political party should be allowed to succeed at the polls unless it pledges itself to carry out these two principles.

This matter of the right to earn should not be a provincial matter but it may have to be taken up by the provinces if the federal administration fails to do its duty.

It will be claimed by many that it is impossible for the nation to provide work for all. Yet it will not be denied that the nation has the ability to produce enough for all. If there is food and clothing for all, there should be a means by which that food and clothing may be available for all.
