Prince Rupert Representation Larger This Year and is Playing Prominent Part

Prince Rupert's representation at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver for this session is larger than it has been for several years. Among the newcomers this year are Oscar Fulton, Rupert Ross and Roger Obata in Second Year Applied Science. Ronnie Allen in First Year Arts and Jack Cade in Second and Third Year Arts.

George Minns is back on the job continuing in Applied Science and gets his recreation on week-ends climbing all over Grouse Mountain with the Outdoors Club. Bob Fraser is due to graduate in Mining Engineering next spring and thinks Fifth year is a pipe compared to the others. He spends his spare time running a fraternity and arguing about politics.

Bill Patmore, after a year's absence has shifted from Science to Third Year Arts and is now toiling away the hours on six geology courses. Behind him in the sophomore class is Bishoo Thurber headed for honors in chemistry.

Archie Thompson, who has consistently distinguished himself in his studies each year since entering Varsity, this year has the important post of news manager of the Ubyessey, the official publication of the University of British Columbia student body.

Rupert's sole representative among the coeds is Irene Mitchell of the Teachers' Training Class. She has her worries teaching Vancouver's young hopefuls about Loro Byron's poetry and the Canadian National Railways.

The colors of the northern interior are carried by Bill Sargent of Hazelton now in his third year. Besides taking a leading part in the Players Club Bill is president of the Arts Men's Undergraduate Society, which includes all the men in the faculty of Arts.

Prominent in Sports
Bill Gwyer, Lloyd Monroe and Jim Pyle are ex-students of Prince Rupert High now attending Varsity. Bill is back in engineering and is playing on the Big 4 Canadian rugby team. Lloyd is in Third Year Science while Jim is in Third Year Arts taking honors in chemistry and, incidentally, playing first-string English rugby.

Ronnie Allen qualified for a position as a sport reporter on the Ubyessey but now thinks he will not be able to go on with it on account of his other work. He is on Varsity's first-string badminton team and also ran third in the half-mile in the recent Varsity-Frosh track meet.

Basketball Popular
Outside of studying, basketball seems to be the favorite student activity of Prince Rupert's scholars at the University. At the top of the list Bill Patmore is ranked as one of the high scorers on this year's Senior B team, which is just one step below Varsity's Senior A squad, former champions of Canada. Next, on the Intermediate A line-up Bishop Thurber and Roger Obata have captured regular positions, while Rupert Ross is playing in the Intermediate B division.

Among twenty-five new members recently selected to the Varsity Outdoors Club are Jack Cade and George Minns. This club owns a cabin on Grouse Mountain where members can take refuge on week-end from their studies and the noise and smoke of the big city. Prospective members are required to accompany the club on two hikes before they are eligible for election.

In addition to this George Minns is also still keeping up his swimming, while Bishop Thurber is gaining further recognition as a player on the Junior Soccer team. Last but not least Rupert is represented on Students' Council and on the first string Canadian and English rugby teams by Milton Owen, whose father was chief of provincial police in Prince Rupert in the very early days. Milt is president of the Men's Undergraduate Society, and intends to study law.

OTTAWA LINING UP

It is announced that there will be a conference of provincial premiers at Ottawa along the line suggested by Premier Pattullo and that proposals will be made for action along various lines calculated to increase employment, to increase the price of farm products and to revive the construction industry.

This may be a good time for Prince Rupert to secure the construction of a new federal building, which has been talked about for many years. If the Bennett government is about to take a forward step in that direction this city might well look for a share of help.

There have been forecasts of a possible forward policy at Ottawa for some time but, now that it is proposed to have a conference in which British Columbia's new Premier is to be represented, it seems as if something would be done when the next Parliament meets. Evidently Prince Rupert's representative had something very definitely in mind when he was talking about work and wages during the campaign.

himself and his career as a parliamentarian, which had lasted, with some small interruptions, for over thirty years, closed for good. Very little more, too, was heard of him by the public at large.

Agreeable Personality

In his days of prominence Augustine Birrell was easily one of the most agreeable personalities of the House of Commons. Not merely did he make a distinguished figure through his gifts as a front bench man but also by reason of his qualities as a platform speaker and for the delight which he gave to thousands of readers through his essays and other writings.

Birrell was the son of a distinguished Liverpool Baptist minister and was born in 1850. Taking up that solid side of the law which is encountered in the Chancery Division, he became a K.C., a Bencher of the Inner Temple, and Quain Professor of Law. There was nothing, though, of the hard dry lawyer in Birrell's mental outlook. In physical appearance his make-up was not at all unlike that of Thackeray. In temperament, too, Birrell betrayed something of Thackeray's genial cynicism, but those who were privileged to meet him on social occasions were never heard to complain that he strove to dominate the talk.

Sympathized With Irish

That Birrell's tenure of the Chief Secretaryship should have finished so unhappily was doubly to be deplored, for, apart from their differences upon the education question, there was a considerable bond of sympathy between himself and the Irish. When, for instance, he was questioned in the House concerning gun-running by the Ulster Volunteers he spoke with obvious satisfaction of "the genius of the people of Ireland for admiring each other." In his usual take-it-or-leave-it manner he gave the Commons his opinion that no useful purpose

would follow from prosecuting either side.

Birrell's reputation as an essayist opened with the publication of the first of his series of "Obiter Dicta" in 1884. In his wit there was pungency in plenty but never malice. Birrell's last literary work of importance was published in 1923, when he edited "Home Letters of the Earl of Beaconsfield."

Birrell's first wife died in 1879. In 1888 he married the daughter of Frederick Locker, the poet, widow of the Hon. Lionel Tennyson. Mrs. Birrell died in 1915.

Derailment On Union Pacific

Traffic Held Up For Five Hours as Result of Stock Train Leaving Track Near Cheyenne

CHEYENNE, Wyoming, Nov. 20.—Transcontinental traffic on the Union Pacific Railway was held up for five hours yesterday as a result of the derailment of twenty-eight cars of a stock train five miles west of Cheyenne. The derailment was caused by a broken wheel on one of the cars and resulted in considerable damage to the equipment of the train as well as the loss of a number of head of stock.
