home after spending a few days in the city, having come in for the mail and supplies for those on the island.



MAKE IMPORTANT FOSSIL MAMMALS FIND



CANADIAN GOVERNMENT PALEONTOLOGISTS MAKE DISCOVERY

Dr. L. S. Russell and Dr. R. T. D. Wickenden of the Geological Survey Department of Mines, Ottawa, have announced the discovery of a new locality for fossil mammals in Canada. The two government paleontologists, working near Swift Current, Sask., have obtained a small collection of fossil teeth proved to represent animals of the late eocene times, which have not previously been found in Canada. Such fossils have been found in Utah and more recently in South California. Teeth of a rhinoceros, of titanothers (large horn-bearing beasts), of a three-toed horse (primitive antelope-like creatures and a fore-runner of the squirrels) are included in the find. A single rabbit tooth is one of the oldest known records of such animals. In the above layout is shown (1) a titanothers, a large horn-bearing animal and (2) a sabre-tooth tiger pulling down a pre-historic horse.

The Newfoundland sealers are on their way to the ice fields where killing may commence on Tuesday next. The fleet this year consists of

six steamers carrying 1200 men from St. John's, and several auxiliary schooners. Captain A. Kean is making his forty-third trip.

The foundering of the Reliance has caused much discussion in Ketchikan. While accidents to small boats in the district are not unusual, the loss of the Reliance with its four-man crew will take its place among the major disasters of its kind in Southeastern Alaska waters. Coming as it does with the apparent loss of four natives aboard the Golden Gate, the dangers to small craft are given concentrated emphasis.

How the Reliance could have foundered is, of course, a matter of pure speculation. Some say that if the vessel were light—as she would be after discharging her cargo in Prince Rupert—foundering in a sea not unusually rough would be possible. Some believe that the engine may have failed and that wind and tide would drive the vessel on the rocky shore.

The Salvage Princess left on

Thursday night for the east coast of Moresby Island where a small Japanese fishing vessel, the Miriam, was in need of assistance. The Princess has not returned yet.

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
