Supplies For The Hospital Considered

Tenders for the supplying of bread and milk to the hospital between April 1 and September 31 were opened at last night's meeting of the hospital board. There were three tenders for milk—Valentin Dairy, Dominion Dairy and Prince Rupert Dairy. It was stated that the services and quality of the milk given in the past by the Valentin Dairy was of a high standard and as there was no difference in price the board decided to continue getting milk for the hospital from this source.

There were three tenders for bread.—La Casse, Rupert and Chriss Mill Bakeries. In view of the fact that the prices quoted were similar it was decided by the board to alternate the buying of the bread between the three bakeries at the quoted price of 5 1-3c for white and brown bread and 7c for raisin bread.

Wolves Were Driven Off by Mrs. E. Hunter
