STEWART, July 19:-H. W. M. Rolston, publisher of the Stewart News of Stewart, has announced himself as an Independent candidate for Atlin riding in the forthcoming provincial election. His candidature was endorsed at a meeting in Anyox this week of those interested in the entry of an Independent candidate in the field for Atlin. He makes the third candidate in the field for the riding, the others being William J. Asselstine, Liberal, and T. J. Shenton, Labor. There are rumors of two more possible entrants in the race.

Senator Pittman's plan regarding the use of silver as part of central bank coverage failed to produce definite results as the sub-committee recommended that action be delayed.

Senator Pittman told the Associated Press that he was quite satisfied with the progress that had been made. "What it means," he said, "is this: all governments; agree to cease debasement or metalling of silver coins except India and Spain and they agree to limit he amount they will sell. We will get back to where silver was before the war."



### POST STILL WELL AHEAD

World Flyer Had Topped His Own Record by Twelve Hours on Reaching Irkutsk

IRKUTSK, Siberia, July 19:-Wiley Post, Oklahoma round the world flyer, was winging his way last night from here to Blagoveschensk, a hop of 1,000 miles, in continuation of his projected attempt to lower the record for globe circumnavigation set two years ago by himself and Harold Gatty in the same plane which he is now flying solo, the Lockheed-Vega machine Winnie Mae. On arrival here yesterday from Novo Sibirsk, having covered the distance in six hours and 42 minutes, he was twelve hours ahead of the record. He hopped off from here at 11 o'clock last night and was reported as having passed Verkneudinsk, Eastern Siberia, at

12:50 a.m. Wednesday. Khabarovsk was awaiting Post's arrival this morning.
