A NEW EXPERIENCE

Prince Rupert is to have a new experience. A commissioner has been appointed to have charge of the city's affairs in the person of W. J. Alder, a former resident, well known to many. He will be in the city before the middle of the month and will be empowered to take over all the activities of the mayor and council, the school board, the library board and any other city authorities if there are any. It will be his duty to handle city relief and to place the finances of the municipality on a sound financial footing. It is probable that he will retain office for several years or at the pleasure of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

After May 15 there will be no more city council meetings, no more aldermanic fireworks, no more deputations. The affairs of the city, it is presumed, will be conducted just like any other ordinary business.

DUTY ON HALIBUT

Just now every possible effort should be made, it would seem, to secure the removal of the two-cent duty on halibut shipped to the United States. If there is to be a reciprocity treaty between Canada and United States, this item is one that should be included. Removal of the duty would injure no one. American fishermen would get just as high prices as formerly but Canadians would also get higher prices.

Almost every day we see fish brought in from the open sea by Canadian boats, caught on the same banks as American fish and shipped to the same market yet local fishermen have to take approximately two cents a pound less for their catches. The condition is galling to Canadian fishermen and particularly so at a time like this when every cent counts.

SURTAX TO BE PUT ON

France Preparing to Protect Herself Against Devaluation of United States Dollar

PARIS, May 4: (Canadian Press)—The ministry of finance has prepared to impose a fifteen percent surtax on United States goods.

This decree, it is learned, is to be issued when the United States dollar approaches twenty francs which officials expect.

Such a surtax is already in effect upon British and Japanese goods.
