### MR. WOODSWORTH'S VISIT

The city had a visit on Sunday from J. S. Woodsworth, leader of the Canadian Co-operative Commonwealth political party. He differed from some politicians in that he had a definite message, unacceptable to many, but still a real message of a method he is prepared to recommend to cure the present economic ills. He is an excellent speaker, clear and reasonable in his manner of delivery and pleasant to listen to.

Mr. Woodsworth was a Methodist parson. From that he graduated into the role of labor leader and today he is a professional politician leading a definite political party. He made a good impression on those who heard him as a man who knows his subject well, knows human nature and who thinks he has a panacea for the ills of the country. If ever he is inclined to weaken, doubtless Mrs. Woodsworth will see that he does not do so.

### HARD ON HOSPITALS

The provincial government recently decided to take the liquor profits grant away from the hospitals and give them instead the proceeds of the meal tax. Now the meal tax has been declared unconstitutional. If the judgment of the police magistrate is found correct and the law is ultra vires, then the hospitals will have to receive some other help from the government. The last liquor check is sent out and there is nothing in sight to take its place.
