UNITED STATES IS HELD RESPONSIBLE CANADIAN ISSUE OF SHORT TERM BONDS IS QUICKLY SOLD

British Compromise Plan for Money Stabilization Thrown Out by Economic Parley

Representatives of Great Britain and European Gold Bloc Decide to Appeal to Washington—American Capital Still Inactive Regarding Problem

LONDON, June 29: (Canadian Press)—An eagerly awaited British compromise plan for the solution of the stabilization crisis of the world economic conference was heaved overboard in a meeting this evening with European gold bloc countries, responsibility for a way out being laid on the doorstep of Washington. Representatives of Great Britain and the European bloc decided to appeal to Washington for assistance in overcoming the stabilization problem. The British compromise had been offered with a view to meeting an ultimatum from the gold standard nations, headed by France, which demanded currency stabilization as the price of their remaining in the conference.

Washington Doing Nothing
 WASHINGTON, D.C., June 29: (Canadian Press)—Dean A. Cieson, Under Secretary of the Treasury, told reporters today that no action was being considered in Washington regarding stabilization of the United States dollar with the British pound sterling and the French franc and that nothing had been done in this respect since President Roosevelt rejected the temporary stabilization proposal forwarded from the world economic conference at London some days ago.

DRY SQUAD BEING CUT

More Than 1300 Employees of Prohibition Bureau in United States to Lose Jobs

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 29:—Attorney General Cummings announces that more than 1300 employees of the prohibition bureau will be furloughed or dismissed on June 30, affecting a saving of approximately \$4,000,000 in the coming fiscal year. This is one of the repercussions of the recent modification of the national prohibition laws.

POUND IS UP, DOLLAR DOWN, LOCAL BANKS

Local banks were trading in the British pound sterling today at the highest rate in over two years, this being due to depreciation of the United States dollar, the premium on which was lower than in two years. The Royal Bank of Canada today gave the mid-rate on the pound sterling in Canadian funds at \$4.83 while the premium on the United States dollar was down to 9½¢ as compared with 10½¢ a couple of days ago.

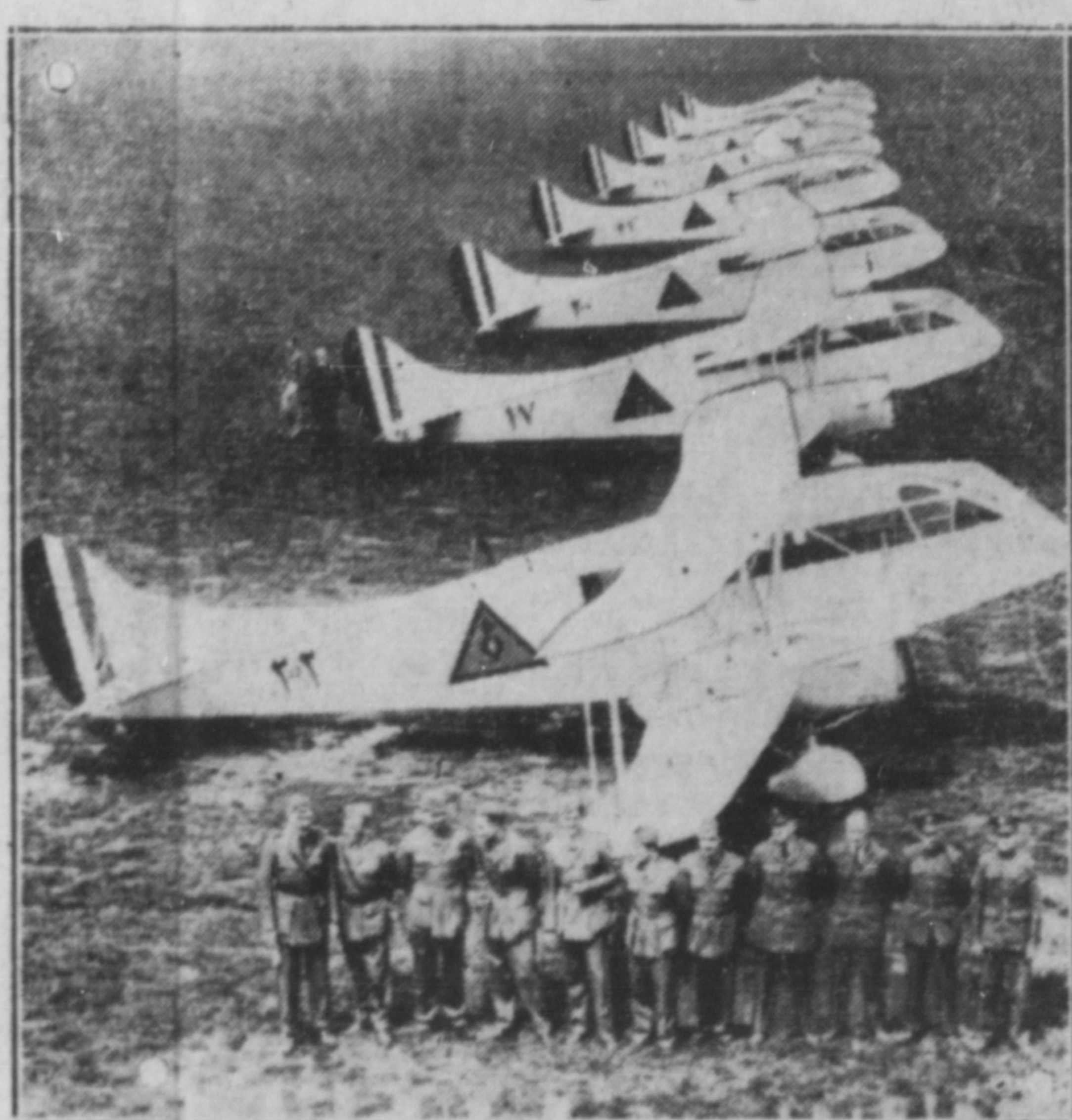
Lambton Liberal-Progressives Name Their Candidate

Made Long Flight



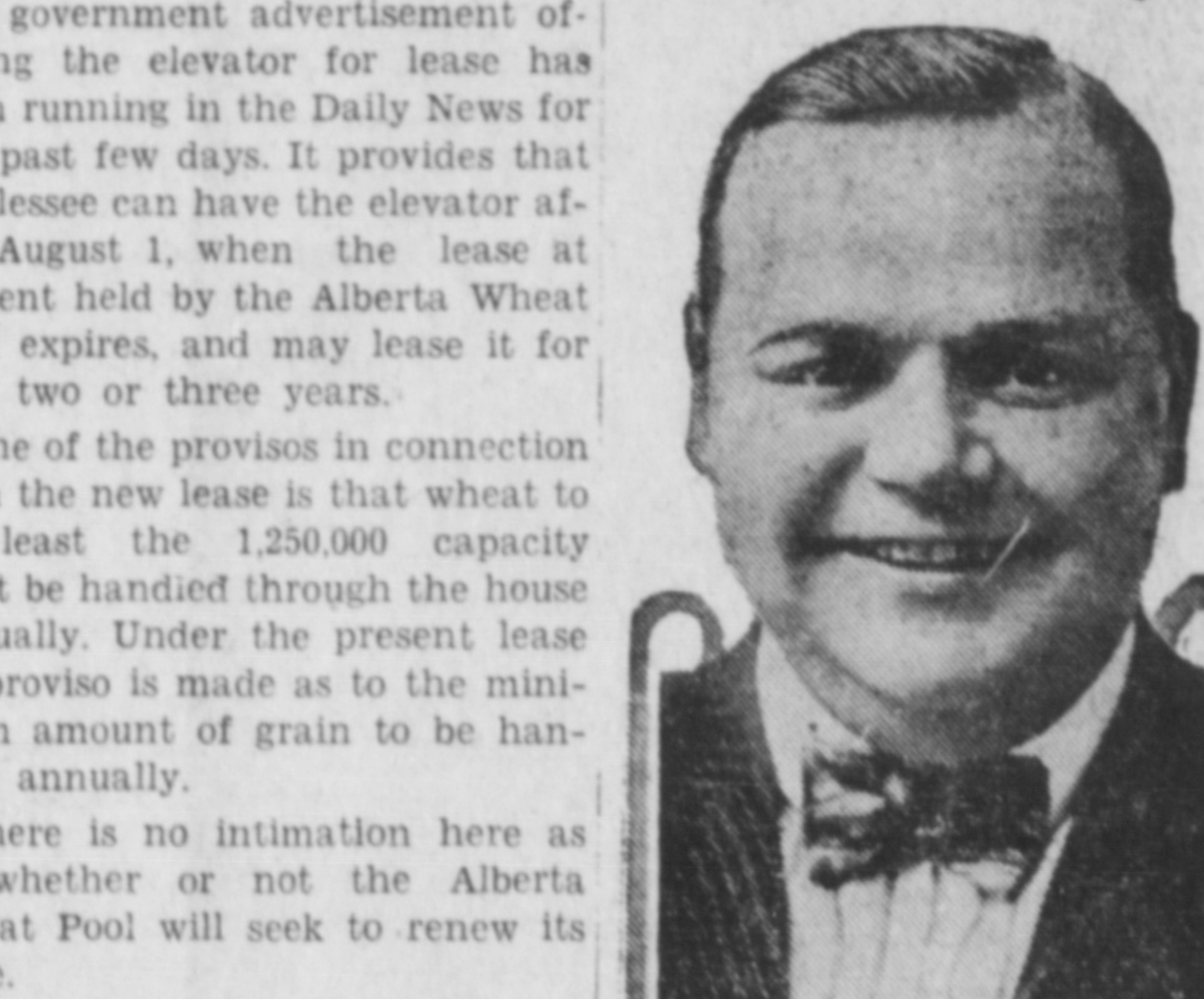

SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MARKET

Sixty-Five Million Dollars in Notes Is Sold In Short Order

Fifteen Month Four Percent Securities Offered by Banking Syndicate Disposed of in New York at 99½

NEW YORK, June 29: (Canadian Press)—A Canadian government bond issue of \$65,000,000 was quickly disposed of on the market here today. It consisted of Dominion of Canada fifteen month four percent notes due on October 1, 1934. The price was 99½. A syndicate headed by the Chase National Bank offered the notes.

NEW YORK GOES WET

Repeal of Eighteenth Amendment Also Ratified in West Virginia and California

ALBANY, N.Y., June 29:—This state ratified repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment on Tuesday under the guidance of Former Governor Alfred E. Smith, arch-foe of prohibition, when 150 delegates to the New York State constitutional convention cast a blanket vote in favor of repeal.

CHARLESTON, West Virginia, June 29:—Approximately half of the vote in this state's election of delegates to the repeal convention indicated a wet victory by a margin of two to one. Some 1000 precincts so far reported give 105,000 votes for repeal and 55,000 against.

LOS ANGELES, June 29:—On the basis of early returns in the special state election of delegates, traditionally dry Southern California voted three to one for repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

SHIPS IN COLLISION

Steamer Cornerbrook and Trawler Flow Crash Near Tip of Cape Cod

BOSTON, Mass., June 29:—Coastguard headquarters here report the collision of the Newfoundland steamer Cornerbrook and the trawler Flow four miles northeast of Highland Light near the tip of Cape Cod.

Tonight's train, due from the East at 10:20, was reported this morning to be on time.

Ore From Eddy Pass Mine To Be Handled For Patterson In Mill on Surf Point Mine

F. T. Patterson, well known pioneer Porcher Island mining man, who is in town on business, authorized the announcement today that he had made arrangements with the Noah Timmins Corporation for the milling of gold ore from his Eddy Pass property on Porcher Island in the mill which is being put into operation by the Timmins interests on the adjoining Surf Point mine. Mr. Patterson was the original owner of the Surf Point mine which has been under development since its purchase a few years ago by Timmins. Handling some 25 tons of ore per day from the Surf Point mine, the mill will be going into production any day now.

The Eddy Pass mine will give two or three days' work monthly to the Surf Point mill, Mr. Patterson's intention being to increase his crew to three or four men as soon as some eighty tons of ore he now has ready for milling is removed. This ore has been taken out by Mr. Patterson and one assistant since the first of the year. The ore on the Eddy Pass property runs some \$60 to \$70 per ton in value, chiefly gold, and there is a substantial quantity in sight in various deposits.
