Fredric March And Claudette Colbert Starred

"Tonight is Ours," which goes on display the first of this week at the Capitol Theatre here, marks the first screen appearance of Fredric March since he won the 1932 award of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences for the best performance of 1932 in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde."

The play, in which Claudette Colbert is co-starred with March, is an amusing and romantic tale of the lives of clever, intelligent people. Miss Colbert is cast as a young woman who has cast aside the responsibilities of a kingdom for a fling at Paris and March as a young Parisian who insists on sharing the fling with her. The romance has its hectic moments as well as its deeply passionate ones. A queer trick of the fates almost wrecks it but a dramatic, breathless climax ultimately sets everything to rights.

Allison Skipworth, popular player of older parts, has an important part in the cast.
