Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Little sailed Saturday afternoon on the Princess Norah for Victoria where Mr. Little will attend the Masonic Grand Lodge annual convention in his capacity as worshipful master of Tsimpsan Lodge here.

Mrs. W. W. Wright and daughter, Audrey, of Atlin, after having spent the past week in the city visiting with friends following their arrival from Vancouver and Victoria, where they have been spending a vacation, sailed by the Princess Louise this morning for Skagway enroute home.

Father J. Langlois O.M.I., who has been on a trip to Dawson on special ecclesiastical work for the Roman Catholic Church, disembarked here from the steamer Princess Norah Saturday afternoon and will proceed from here to his headquarters at Edmonton on tonight's train, stopping off at Lejac enroute.

Making her final appearance of the season here after having operated throughout the past winter and spring on the Alaska route, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, called here from 4 o'clock to 5:30 Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. The vessel, which will now be transferred to the West Coast of Vancouver Island run for the summer, brought in 29 passengers from the north. Seven persons disembarked from the vessel here while a similar number took passage from here for the south aboard her.

Rev. and Mrs. W. D. Grant Hollingworth returned to the city on Saturday night's train from Terrace where they spent last week as guests of M. and Mrs. John McRae.

Dickson, did not arrive in port until 11:40 last night from the south, leaving a couple of hours later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points. The vessel is due back here tomorrow morning and is scheduled to sail at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.
