Liberal Party Records Decisive Victory In Provincial Election; C.C.F. Affords Main Opposition

GRITS ELECT THIRTY MEMBERS WHILE CO-OPERATIVE COMMONWEALTH CAPTURES SIX SEATS, INDEPENDENTS, THREE, LABOR, ONE, AND UNIONISTS, ONE.

Pooley is Sole Survivor Of Government; Premier Beaten

TOM UPHILL, VETERAN LABORITE, AGAIN IN HOUSE—MRS. PAUL SMITH IS ONLY SUCCESSFUL WOMAN—MANSON, BARROW, PEARSON AND MCGEER ARE ALL IN.

VICTORIA, Nov. 3: (CP)—The Liberal party, under T. D. Pattullo, re-elected member for Prince Rupert, who will undoubtedly be called upon to form the next government of British Columbia, recorded a decisive victory in yesterday's provincial election. The Liberals elected 30 members while the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation won six seats—two in Vancouver East and one each in Burnaby, Vancouver North, Mackenzie and Dewdney.

Hon. R. H. Pooley, attorney-general, in the traditional family seat in Esquimalt, was the sole survivor of the Tolmie government, winning by a small margin over his Liberal opponent, C. E. Whitney-Griffiths. Premier Tolmie went down to defeat in Saanich at the hands of N. W. Whittaker, Liberal, by more than three hundred of a majority. Hon. J. W. Jones, minister of finance, lost out in South Okanagan by a majority of 150 to Dr. J. A. Harris, the youthful Liberal candidate. Hon. W. M. Dennies, minister of labor, was defeated in Vancouver-Burrard, and Hon. William Savage, minister of public works, in Vancouver-Point Grey, both by large majorities.

Tom Uphill, veteran Labor member, whose candidature was endorsed by the C. C. F., was re-elected in Fernie with a substantial margin over Mayor H. E. Douglas, Liberal.

Hugh Savage, who announced himself as a follower of Oxford Group principles running as an Independent, was elected in Cowichan-Newcastle with a good majority over C. F. Davie, former Speaker of the House who sought reelection as an Independent-Non Partizan.

NORTHERN RIDINGS

Clive Planta, Independent Non-Partizan and member of a well known Nanaimo Conservative family, was apparently elected as the first member for the new Peace River riding.

Mayor L. D. Taylor polled only sixty odd votes in Omineca where A. M. Manson K.C. was re-elected by a large majority over A. E. Windle, C. C. F., and Sam Cocker, Independent Non-Partizan.

Scattered reports from Skeena riding indicated one of the largest proportionate majorities in the entire province for E. T. Kenney, Liberal, over Joseph Panter, C. C. F., and Dr. R. C. Bamford, Independent. Terrace, Hazelton, Smithers and Port Essington all went very heavily for Kenney.

In Fort George H. G. Perry, Liberal, also was heading for a big majority over the combined vote of four opponents with Alexander Sinclair, C. C. F., apparently second and Dr. R. W. Alward, third.

Atlin gave a clear-cut plurality to W. J. Asselstine, Liberal, with T. J. Shenton, C. C. F., second; H. F. Kergin, Independent Liberal, third, and T. W. Falconer and H. W. M. Rolston, Independents, neck and neck for fourth place. Latest figures to date: Asselstine, 382; Shenton, 277; Kergin, 205; Rolston, 125; Falconer, 119.

OUTSTANDING LIBERALS

Other outstanding Liberals to be elected were Dr. W. H. Sutherland, who doubled the vote of his C. C. F. opponent, Vincent Segur, in Revelstoke-Columbia; E. D. Barrow, who had a safe margin over a strong C. C. F. candidate, J. P. Wheeler, in Chilliwack; G. S. Pearson, who won over Dr. Lyle Telford, who made a strong race for the C. C. F., Dr. G. A. B. Hall, one of the Independent Non-Partizan leaders, hardly figuring in the contest, and G. G. McGeer, who headed the poll in Vancouver-Burrard. All these, with Mr. Manson, are considered probable cabinet material for Mr. Pattullo.

Mrs. Paul Smith, Liberal, in Vancouver-Burrard, was the only woman elected, although there were ten women candidates in all. She is the second woman to sit in the Legislature of British Columbia, Mrs. Ralph (Mary Ellen) Smith, who died recently, having been the first.

In the most of districts the Liberals had their hardest

Great Personal Victory For Pattullo One of Features Of Provincial General Election

One of the greatest personal victories in the entire British Columbia general election yesterday was that of T. D. Pattullo, member-re-elect for Prince Rupert and Premier-designate of British Columbia, for whom a vote of almost two to one over the combined polling strength of his two opponents—G. W. Rudderham, C. C. F., and Charles Chapman, United Front, was rolled up.

Prince Rupert city gave Mr. Pattullo a total of 1406 votes, Mr. Rudderham, 464, and Mr. Chapman, 231. With the most of the Queen Charlotte Islands returns in and only a few small polls yet to report,

VICTORIA, Nov. 3: (CP)—"The people have spoken and I think I fully appreciate their decision," stated T. D. Pattullo today in commenting upon yesterday's election result. Premier S. F. Grant Hollingworth following which the remains were placed aboard the steamer Prince George by which they are being transported to Victoria where interment will take place next Monday afternoon.

Mr. Hollingworth, in his funeral address, referred to the high esteem in which deceased was held by all who had been favored with her friendship and acquaintanceship during life. He also voiced suitable words of comfort for the bereaved. Hymns were "Son of My Soul" and "Come Let Us Sing of a Wonderful Love," these having been favorites of Mrs. Watt.
