NEW PRESIDENT OF CUBA TO BE CHOSEN, WILL PROBABLY BE CARLOS MANUEL DE CESPEDES WHO WAS FORMERLY AMBASSADOR TO U.S.

HAVANA, Aug. 12:-The Cuban state department today formally advised the diplomatic corps that President Machado will take leave of absence and that it is the president's purpose later to resign.

The President's decision followed closely on a bloodless coup d'état by the army last night in which the military united, seized fortresses and other strategic points and demanded that Machado get out.

Colonel Antonio Jiminez, chief of the dreaded secret police of the outgoing Machado regime, was shot and killed by soldiers today after he had wounded an unidentified man who was celebrating the end of the Machado regime.

All political factions this afternoon are agreed that Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, former ambassador to the United States, should be the new president.
