#### Civic Hospital and Customs House Are Razed to Ground; Thousands Homeless and Property Damage is Enormous

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 26: (CP)—Mexico's resources were mobilized today to aid the storm-stricken and flooded city of Tampico where the estimated dead and injured are as high as five thousand. Many thousands are homeless and enormous property damage has been done.

The wind reached a velocity of 125 miles per hour and levelled the civic hospital to the ground. The customs house was also razed. Other buildings were damaged or destroyed.

#### WORKLESS IN STRIKE

Unemployed Relief Camp in Ontario  
Closed Up and Men Will be  
Housed in Toronto

LONG BEACH, Ont., Sept. 26:—As a result of the strike of seven hundred men at a federal unemployment camp at Lakeview, orders have been received from Ottawa to close the camp and the men have begun to march to Toronto where accommodations are being prepared for them.

#### Kingfish Declares His Enemies Tried To Burn His Home

#### AUSTRIA HAS DICTATORSHIP

Chancellor Dollfuss Takes on Increased Powers Following Political Crisis

VIENNA, Austria, Sept. 26:—Confronted with a grave political crisis, Chancellor Dollfuss has made himself virtual dictator of Austria by drastic reorganization of his cabinet, it is officially announced.

#### DEATH OF EDUCATOR

Dr. Henry Suzzallo, Former President of University of Washington, Passes in Seattle

#### Brilliant Career

Was Honored by University of B.C. And Other Institutions

SEATTLE, Sept. 26: (CP)—Dr. Henry Suzzallo, aged 58, internationally known educator, died yesterday in hospital here after a week's illness which interrupted a national tour as chairman of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. Seven years ago Dr. Suzzallo was removed as president of the University of Washington by Governor Roland H. Hartley who accused him of mixing education and politics. He had since been with the Carnegie Foundation.

When he became president of the University of Washington in 1915, the university had an enrollment of 2,000, but attracted little attention outside the state of Washington. Dr. Suzzallo immediately inaugurated a progressive program of development which eventually placed Washington among the leading universities of the country. Its enrollment had increased to 7,000 at the time he left the presidency.

In ousting him the board of regents, which was appointed by the governor, lauded his work as an educator and gave him due credit for developing the university.

Dr. Suzzallo was born in San Jose, Cal., August 22, 1875. Graduating from the state normal school at San Jose in 1895, he received his bachelor's degree from Leland Stanford University in 1899, his master's degree from Columbia University in 1902 and the degree of doctor of philosophy in 1905.

During these years lack of money frequently forced him to give up his studies and in the interim he filled various educational positions.

After receiving his doctor's degree he became professor of the (Continued on page three)

#### Train Crashes--Storm Destroyed Bridge



The locomotive of the Crescent Limited, crack Southern R. The engineer and fireman of the train were killed and 13 passengers injured in the accident which is said to have been due to the storm uprooting the bridge.

#### North Vancouver Leads Province In Number of Candidates Offering For Election in the Legislature

NORTH VANCOUVER, Sept. 26:—This riding seems to be leading the way in the number of candidates hoping to secure the one seat in the legislature. While four or five candidates is not uncommon in different parts of the province, this constituency now boasts of seven nominations with the possibility of another independent and a labor entry. The latest additions to the list are R. E. Bray, who announces himself as the "poor man's" candidate and George Lewis the "sane system" aspirant.

#### PROMINENT ONTARIAN

Mr. Justice W. E. Raney, Former Progressive Leader, Passes Away at Age of 74

#### Was Reformer

Served as Attorney General in Drury Government and Later As Leader of Opposition

TORONTO, Sept. 26: (CP)—Hon. William Edgar Raney, B.C.L., K.C., ex-M.L.A., former leader of the Progressive wing of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, and for the past few years Justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario, died on Sunday at the age of 74 years. He occupied a prominent place in public affairs for a number of years and was a consistent, courageous fighter for his convictions under all circumstances.

In private life he was a quiet, kindly man. He was born near Aultsville, Stormont County, Ont., December 8, 1859 of Huguenot and United Empire Loyalist stock. The Raney farm adjoined the farm on which the late Sir James Whitney (Continued on Page Four)

#### WAS DEAN OF SENATE

Hon. Pascal Poirier Was Last Surviving Appointee of Sir John A. Macdonald

OTTAWA, Sept. 26 (Canadian Press)—The last surviving appointee of Sir John A. Macdonald, first Premier of Canada, to the Upper Chamber, Senator Pascal Poirier, B.A., died here on Monday of a heart attack. He was eighty-one years of age.

Senator Poirier was born at Shediac, New Brunswick, in 1852 and was educated at St. Joseph's College at Memrancook. He became a barrister both in the provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec and was postmaster of the House of Commons from 1872 to 1885. He was the author of a number of works on historical subjects pertaining to the early days of Acadia and took a deep interest in literary, scientific and mineralogical subjects. A Liberal-Conservative, he was summoned to the Senate in 1885.

Senator Poirier's home was at Shediac. Senator Poirier was married in 1879 to Anna Lusignan.

#### DROWNING BELIEVED

Triple Tragedy Feared in English Bay, Vancouver, Following Finding of Boat

VANCOUVER, Sept. 26: (CP)—Mrs. Archie Gifford, aged 40, and her daughters, Shirley, aged nine, and Donna, seven, are believed to have been drowned yesterday following the finding of their drifting rowboat in English Bay. It is thought possible that the mother may have lost her life in trying to rescue the children. Mrs. Gifford's brother told the police that she had been despondent because her husband could not get work.
