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TEACHERS HEAR TALK

Visitor From North Vancouver Entertained in Prince Rupert and Discusses Education Problems

Miss H. A. R. Anderson, M.A., Ph.D., principal of the Lonsdale School, North Vancouver, and member of the Central Executive of the B. C. Teachers' Federation, who is on her way to address a convention of teachers at Prince George, has been entertained by the local teachers during the past few days.

Yesterday morning Dr. Anderson was driven around town and shown the interesting sights of Prince Rupert including a visit to the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. In the afternoon she addressed the teachers of the city and district in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Mitchell. Dr. Anderson's address dealt chiefly with the important work which has recently been accomplished by the B. C. Teachers' Federation in the interests of education in the province. The recent amendments to the School Act passed by the Legislature were discussed and explained. The program for the fourteenth annual convention of the British Columbia Teachers' Federation had been deliberately planned to bring before the teachers of the province the facts and realities of the present economic situation. The teachers would have the opportunity of listening to such men as G. G. McGeer, K.C., Dr. W. A. Carrothers, Professor of Economics, University of British Columbia, B. C. Nicholas, Editor Victoria Times, Dr. G. M. Weir, Professor of Education, University of British Columbia, Dr. Daniel Buchanan, Dean of Faculty of Arts, University of British Columbia, as well as other prominent men who have carried on a constant battle during the last year in the cause of education.
