restoration of the former basis.  
Mr. Chapman being also in favor  
of the government assuming re-  
sponsibility for defraying deficits  
of hospitals occasioned through the  
treatment of unemployed who  
were unable to pay their own hos-  
pital accounts. The letters were  
ordered filed.
