
# PRIVY COUNCIL GIVES JUDGMENT IN COMPENSATION CASE

# Vancouver Company Loser In Its Appeal To Court In London

Action Was Based on Dispute Over Rates at Which Employees May be Assessed For Medical and Other Services

LONDON, July 28: (Canadian Press)—The judicial committee of the Privy Council today dismissed an appeal by Merrill, Ring, Wilson Limited of Vancouver based on a dispute over rates at which employees may be assessed by the Workmen's Compensation Board. Merrill, Ring and a group of operators had endeavored to obtain a man-

damus to enjoin the board from assessing operators as it was doing for medical and other services. They lost in the British Columbia courts and appealed to the Privy Council which has now also found against them.
