BRITISH GOVERNMENT AND WAR DEBTS

Will the National Government of Great Britain go on the rocks on the war debt issue? Such is the question that many people are speculating upon today.

It is significant that Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, ultra-Conservative Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, old line Liberal President of the Board of Trade, appear to be leading the cabinet faction which is definitely in favor of complete repudiation of the debts.

Meantime, the announcement promised by Mr. Chamberlain for tomorrow on the government's position on the war debt issue will be awaited with much interest.

GET CONFERENCE OVER FIRST

There are a number of other issues pending which would appear to threaten early breaking up of the National Government and, with that, very probably, another general election in Great Britain.

It is greatly to be hoped, however, that the government continues in existence at least until after the now opening world economic conference in London is over.
