The hospital board, at its regular monthly meeting last Friday evening, made a grant of \$10 to the grounds committee for the purchase of bulbs which will be planted this fall.

Alex Tolmie was found guilty in city police court, Saturday on a charge of having stolen goods in his possession and was remanded until today when he was sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

Delayed by having had heavy freights to discharge at cannery points on her way up the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 6:25 Saturday morning from Vancouver and waypoints, several hours behind time, and sailed at 9 a.m. on her return south.

On motion of G. P. Tinker and G. V. Wilkinson, the hospital board, at its regular monthly meeting last Friday night, passed a resolution of congratulation to Miss Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, on the success which had been attained by candidates sent up from the local training school to the recently held Registered Nurses' examinations.

Inaugurating the company's schedule of weekly tourist sailings to Alaska for the summer, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Captain Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver with a large list of passengers on board and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points. Incidentally, this is the final voyage of the season for the Princess Norah on the Alaska route. The Princess Louise will take up service on the run next week with the Princess Charlotte going into commission the following week. The Princess Norah brought 120 passengers on her arrival here, seven passengers leaving the vessel at this port and thirteen boarding her here for the north.

An interesting journalistic relic has come into the possession of William Cruickshank, city ticket agent here for the Canadian National Railway in the form of an original copy of the New York Herald of April 15, 1865, in which the assassinations of President Abraham Lincoln and Secretary of State Seward are recorded. Students of American history will remember that President Lincoln was fatally shot by John Wilkes Booth, an actor, during the presentation of a play at Ford's Theatre in Washington while Secretary Seward was stabbed while he lay in his sick bed at Washington. The old paper gives full details of both tragedies. The paper also contains dispatches of news in the closing days of the Civil War. Such newspaper antiques are now comparatively rare and are, therefore, much to be prized.

Conductor T. M. Spencer arrived in the city on Saturday night's train from Smithers to spend the week-end at his home here and will return to the interior tonight to resume duty on his run between Smithers and Prince George. Mrs. Spencer returned home last week from a visit in Smithers.

Delayed by having had heavy freights to discharge at points of call along the coast, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night from the south, and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox and Stewart as well as other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning and sail at 1:30 p.m. for the south.

H. F. Pullen, who has been on a trip to various interior points is now expected to return to the city on tomorrow night's train. He had planned being back on Saturday night with Mrs. Pullen and two daughters, who have been visiting in Regina, but plans were changed and Mrs. Pullen is remaining over for a while longer in Regina owing to her father, who has been ill for some time, taking a sudden turn for the worse.

Frank Dibb, chairman, reported at the regular monthly meeting of the hospital board last Friday evening that some of the members of the graduating nursing staff were taking two months' holiday, one month with pay and one month without, this summer in order that some work might be provided for newer graduates who otherwise might not have any. The spirit of such nurses as were doing this was to be commended, declared Mr. Dibb.

Necessary kalsomining, painting and varnishing had also been carried out in the nurses' home and cleaning of moss from the roof had been attended to. Also a leak in the roof of the operating room of the hospital had been repaired and a general inspection made of the whole roof which had been found to be in fairly good shape.
