Archie Johnson K.C., One of B.C.'s Leading Legal Lights, Dies Suddenly at Victoria

Archibald M. Johnson K.C., for years chief crown prosecutor in Brilegal minds in this province, passed away suddenly this morning in a Victoria hospital where he had been a patient since the day before yesterday, according to word received today in Prince Rupert. Although his friends had known that he had been in failing health for some time, news of his demise will come as a shock to his wide circle of acquaintanceship throughout the province. He was well known in Prince Rupert as well as elsewhere in the north and had recently attended the Supreme Court Assizes in Prince George in his capacity as crown prosecutor.

Mrs. Leonard B. Wrinch of Hazelton was a daughter of the late Mr. Johnson who had practised law in the province for many years and who, during his career, had been associated with a number of other leading benchers of British Columbia. He moved from Nelson to Victoria some years ago on being appointed to the attorney general's department.

Union officials said that a strike would not necessarily follow the ballot as further negotiations would be carried on before a final decision is made.
