"Conditions in Canada are past the worst and we are on the updefinitely," declared Mr. Fraser. He referred to the increased prices of practically all basic commodities. This was a sure sign of returning prosperity, he felt.

The Cariboo member discussed the federal and provincial railway situation and referred to the distinctly improved showings being made both by the Canadian National and Pacific Great Eastern lines. He predicted that the P. G. E. might be expected ere long to commence, owing to mining development alone, to repay the investment that had been made in it by the people of the province.

While there were still many pressing problems to be met such as that of unemployment, Mr. Fraser urged his listeners not to be too pessimistic and to take stock of their personal and community affairs which it was important should be kept in as good order as possible. 


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
