



other points. There was at present only one wayfreight and it arrived Saturday afternoon and the cars were often not spotted until the Monday. That made it impossible to ship fresh lettuce.

Another suggestion was that the growers should organize and see that shipments were made in an orderly manner. The last few weeks there had been a glut of strawberries. They must realize that they were in a competitive market. Packing must be as good as the product grown in the south.

A number of suggestions and examples were quoted. In regard to the use of the market building, he had no objection to it but he thought the farmers should be given no preferences that were not also given to the merchants who were also taxpayers in the city. He thought it would be a good thing for the farmers to come in and talk matters over. The present condition of affairs was not satisfactory to anyone.

W. M. Blackstock

W. M. Blackstock said there were plenty of organizations of buyers in the city. What was needed was better organization at the other end. A cash market would be a great benefit to the farmers. He suggested that Smithers could arrange to ship to one of the existing agencies. The buyers were here if the goods shipped were of the kind wanted.

Dr. Kergin thanked the speakers for their expressions and suggested that the discussion would tend to do good. He thought a campaign of education should be embarked upon that would make for the welfare of both the people of the interior and the residents in this city.

ENDURANCE MARK SET

Lou Gehrig in His 1308th Consecutive Game as Yanks Pennant Hopes Nearly Fade Out

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 18: (CP)—Lou Gehrig, Yankee first baseman, yesterday set up a new endurance record for a Major League ball player by playing his 1308th consecutive game in the meeting of the New Yorkers with the St. Louis Browns. The Yankee pennant hopes, however, further faded when the world champions dropped the decision to the locals by the odd run after ten innings of play.

Everett Scott, former Yankee shortstop, held the former endurance record of 1307.

The Washington Senators, who are all but assured of capturing the American League flag this season increased their margin of leadership by another full game by inflicting an ignominious defeat upon the Chicago White Sox for their ninth straight victory.

In the National League, the New York Giants, who appear due to cop in the senior circuit, extended their margin over the idle Chicago Cubs by half a game by defeating the cellar-dwelling Cincinnati Reds while the St. Louis Cardinals replaced the idle Boston Braves in fourth place by winning over the Phillies.

The ship's complement consists of 450 of all ratings. The ship is one of the "D" Class cruisers, several of which have visited Prince Rupert from time to time. She was launched in 1918. She is 472 feet in length, and is of 4,650 tons registry. The ship is equipped with six six-inch guns, three four-inch guns, four three-pounders, two two-pounder pom-poms, and 12 twenty-one-inch torpedo tubes.
