The Yankee pennant hopes, however, further faded when the world champions dropped the decision to the locals by the odd run after ten innings of play.

Everett Scott, former Yankee shortstop, held the former endurance record of 1307.

The Washington Senators, who are all but assured of capturing the American League flag this season increased their margin of leadership by another full game by inflicting an ignominious defeat upon the Chicago White Sox for their ninth straight victory.
