PILCHARD FAILURE

Government Has to Provide Relief For Fishermen of West Coast Of Vancouver Island

VICTORIA, Aug. 18: (CP)—So serious is the plight of the pilchard industry of the West Coast of Vancouver Island that Hon. W. M. Dennes, minister of labor, has arranged for the provincial government to provide maintenance for 420 fishermen and their families who had depended in the past upon the pilchard run for their living.

As foretold by Old Wrinkles, grizzled patriarch of the Ahousat Indians, the pilchard herds of the Pacific, have failed to reach the West Coast of Vancouver Island this season.

HARVESTING IS GENERAL

This Year's Western Wheat Crop is Of Fine Quality

WINNIPEG, Aug. 18:—Harvesting is now general over the western provinces except in the more northerly districts of Saskatchewan and Alberta, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture, Canadian National Railways. In the southern parts of the three provinces threshing machines are humming and deliveries at country points are increasing. The quality and grade of the outturn so far is good and, if fine weather continues during threshing, this year's western wheat crop should be of exceptionally high quality.

Cutting in Southern and Central Manitoba is almost completed but is not so far advanced in the northerly districts. Threshing is in full swing and great variations in yields are being realized. Both quality and yield of coarse grains vary a great deal from one farm to another even in similar localities.

In Northern Manitoba Dauphin, north and west, will harvest a normal yield crop with some districts producing one of the best crops on record.

In Saskatchewan Along the Lewvan, Lampman, Avonlea, Gravelbourg, Central Butte, Riverhurst, Glenavon subdivisions, weather has been warm with scattered showers and wheat cutting is about 75% completed. In some of these localities fields are too poor to be cut for anything except feed while others show prospects of averaging around twenty bushels to the acre. Coarse grains are poor and the yield will be very light. Garden yields will also be light.

Central Saskatchewan has conditions similar to Southern Saskatchewan as many districts will harvest extremely light crops while others can expect a fair to good outturn. Prospects are from fair to poor along the Blaine Lake and Lanigan subdivisions with other subdivisions centering on Prince Albert showing more promise although harvest will not really be fully under way until next week.

Weather in the southern territories of Alberta has continued mostly dry and warm. Some districts received a few scattered showers but these were of little benefit at this late date. Grasshoppers continue numerous in some localities along the Drumheller and Oyen subdivisions with their attendant damage. Along these subdivisions wheat will yield from two to ten bushels to the acre.

The Three Hills subdivision reports grain ripening very fast and cutting has commenced. The estimated yield is twenty-five bushels to the acre. Central Alberta along the Camrose, Viking, Vegreville, Alliance, Blackfoot subdivisions report cutting just nicely commenced. No damage has been experienced from any source and the outturn should be satisfactory.

Fine Weather in Peace Weather in the Peace River has been fine and warm, grain is ripening fast and cutting will be general within a few days. Prospects for an average crop along the Northern Alberta Railways are good.

Harvest operations dried up the flow of cattle on western stock yards this week which resulted in a strengthening of prices.

Taylor had been previously released on parole while serving time for grand theft.

Killing of Assyrians Necessitates Exercise of Mandatory Powers

Six Hundred Christians Reported to Have Been Slaughtered by Kurds—Each Side Holds Other Responsible For Outbreak of Trouble

BAGDAD, Iraq, Aug. 18: (CP)—Killing of more than six hundred Assyrian Christians in conflicts with the Kurds and Iraq forces in Northern Iraq has climaxed an international situation in which Great Britain, as the formal mandatory power over Iraq, has been moved to take a hand. Bodies to the number of 315 have been found at the village of Simeil and three hundred more have been discovered in different places in the vicinity of Docuk following the Kurdish raids on Assyrian communities.

ROBBERY IN VANCOUVER

Two Arrested Following Hold-up of Cashier of Hardware Firm Yesterday

VANCOUVER, Aug. 18: (CP)—Two men are in custody in connection with the robbery of R. A. Pearce, cashier for Marshall, Wells Ltd., who was slugged by three men yesterday afternoon and robbed of \$70 in cash and \$11,000 in checks. The attack took place at the mouth of Shanghai Alley on Pender Street. Allan Joseph McDonald is charged with robbery with violence while a second man is being held for investigation.

The British government has offered asylum in Cyprus to the Assyrian leader Marshimim who, with his father and brother, was deported today by the Iraq government. It was charged that he was responsible for the Assyrian outbreak which led to the fighting.

The official Iraq contention is that the Assyrians were killed in a battle after a group of them crossed the Tigris River a fortnight ago and wiped out a force of Iraq troops.

Chief Engineer W. E. Baillie of the steamer Prince Rupert is being accompanied on the present voyage north of that steamer by his young son, Fred Baillie, who is making the round trip to Prince Rupert, Anyox and Stewart.

His Majesty's Ship Dragon Arriving in Prince Rupert Today For Six Days' Visit

Hearty Welcome to be Extended to Warship—Carnival Next Week to be One of Features of Destroyer's Stay

H. M. S. Dragon, light cruiser of the American-West-Indies squadron of the Royal Navy, in the course of a Pacific Coast cruise, is due to arrive in Prince Rupert at 3:30 or shortly thereafter this afternoon and will pay a visit of six days to the port. The warship comes here from Comox, where she has been engaging in battery practice, and, leaving this port on Thursday of next week, will proceed to Powell River which will be her last port of call in British Columbia waters. After Powell River, the ship will go to Portland, Ore., on her way back to her base in the West Indies via California and the Panama Canal.

It is not the first visit to Prince Rupert of the Dragon which was here three years ago in the course of a similar cruise. However, her personnel has been largely changed from that time from her commander down. Nevertheless, Prince Rupert has prepared to extend the usual hearty welcome to the officers and men of the vessel and various local organizations are co-operating under the city commissioner in the program of entertainment. The visiting naval men are expected to take a prominent part in connection with the carnival to be staged on Tuesday and Wednesday of next week by the Fair Board.
