One of the pretty styles of the season is the white linen dress, made with a simple collar and cuffs of some dainty color. A little dress designed in this way is illustrated in the sketch, and shows a development of white linen with collar and cuffs of green linen overlaid with a heavy white linen lace. The effect is unusually dainty, and the idea would develop in any number of color combinations. A hat faced with the color introduced in the dress and a girdle also of the same tint would prove effective.

LINEN COSTUMES

Summer Fashions in Cool and Pretty Materials

A suit that is very effective, but which every woman cannot wear, is one of grey, or grey and white striped crash. White linen is of course always used, though it soils very easily, and there has been this season quite a revival of pique in white and in plain colors. Prime favorite, however, is the suit of deep tan linen, the reason being that it suits nearly every face and figure. Even if the color be not exactly becoming to one's complexion, it can be easily offset by a collar bow of red, black or king's blue. The tan suits are shown practically all made according to the same patterns. The skirts are moderately narrow, with a three-inch hem finished with a row of stitching. The waist line is extended slightly above the normal, and the place of fastening is usually the left front, tan or pearl buttons being used. One may have white buttons if one cares for the contrast. The coat is made a little looser about the hips than we have seen for some time, the lines, however, being perfectly straight. Some of the coats are finished smartly with a two-inch patent leather belt, which runs through a small strap in the middle of the back, and finishes in front with a plain large buckle.

Ice Cream

Try ice cream with cake instead

of pudding when the days are hottest.

Strawberry Ice Cream.—Mash 1 quart strawberries, and add to plain ice cream when it is nearly solid. Beat vigorously for a minute or two after adding the fruit. The foundation for any fruit-cream may be 1 quart rich milk and a pint of cream, sweetened rather more than for plain ice cream.

A Simple Ice Cream.—To 1 pint rich cream and 1 pint milk, allow a scanty cup sugar, the white of 1 egg and a tablespoonful vanilla extract. Scald the milk and cream, stir in the sugar, and set away to cool. When cold, add the vanilla and pour into the freezer. Add the well-beaten white of the egg and freeze.

IF YOU LIKE MUSHROOMS

Cut Out and Keep This List of Ways to Cook Them

Mushrooms Stewed—Peel and trim a pint of small mushrooms, pour a pint of fresh milk into a saucepan, add a tablespoonful of butter, a little pepper and salt, and the mushrooms. Boil gently 10 minutes, then add half a cupful of rich cream. Serve on buttered toast.

Mushrooms au Parmesan—Peel and trim the mushrooms, and soak them for about an hour in oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper, then fry them and broil a little. Have ready a nicely flavored white sauce, pour this over them, sprinkle thickly with grated Parmesan cheese and brown in the oven; serve very hot.

Mushroom Salad—Chop the mushrooms into dice and put them into a saucepan with a little butter and two slices of peeled lemon; let them simmer in this until done, then set them aside to cool. Serve with a mayonnaise dressing and saltines.

Mushroom Patties—Make the shells of puff paste in the regular way. For the filling, cut raw mushrooms into squares, fry them in butter, add a little cream, thicken with the yolk of an egg, season and add a little minced parsley.

Mushrooms and Eggs—Peel, and mince them fine, cook in rich gravy until well flavored and thick, then add five eggs well beaten, stirring all the time, season with pepper and salt and serve on fried bread.

Mushrooms a la Bourgeoise—Peel and trim some nice firm mushrooms, place a few slices of nicely streaked bacon on the fire in a

Let them stew very gently until the sauce becomes thick and creamy, then add a little lemon juice and pour over squares of fried bread. Serve very hot.—Good Housekeeping Magazine.
